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OHIO S.27 (#3) Smoke Control. Bill will (1) authorize municipalities to inspect and regulate fuel-burning equipment within an area extending three miles outside municipal boundaries, (2) fix penalties for violations of any such municipal ordinances so enacted, (3) permit two closely situated municipalities to set up a jointly administered plan of inspection and regulation. Hearing date in Senate Jan. 30.

CALIFORNIA HR 65 Pollution Study. Relative to the creating of a Fact Finding Committee on air and water pollution. To Rules Jan. 23.

COLORADO H.390 Water Pollution. Relating to the control, prevention and abatement of pollution of the surface and underground waters of the state, to designate a state water pollution control agency, to create a state water pollution control council, to provide for the appointment of the members thereof and their terms of office and duties. To State Affairs Feb. 15.

H.414 Pollution of Waters. Providing for the condemnation of lands by persons or corporations engaged in mining, milling, industrial, manufacturing, metallurgical and similar pursuits to avoid pollution of waters and water courses. To Mines and Mining Feb. 15.

KANSAS H.228 Water Pollution. Relates to preventing stream pollution, amends CS-171 D, CS 1249 and makes act also apply to fresh water strata. Introduced Feb. 9; referred to Hygiene-Public Health Feb. 14.

Air Pollution. Requesting the Governor to reappoint the Commission on Noxious Fumes. To Finance Feb. 3.

S.133

Air Pollution. To add Sec. 115A to Art. 43 of the Code (1957 Ed.), title "Health," said new section to be known as Section 115A, following immediately after Section 115 of said Article, and to be under the new sub-title "Noxious Fumes," providing for an appropriation by the State for the study and control of air pollution and for the manner of expending such appropriation, reading as follows: "The Governor is hereby authorized and directed to place in the budget as submitted to the General Assembly at each regular session thereof, an item for appropriating the sum of at least One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00) annually to the State Department of Health for the study and control of air pollution of Maryland. The Budget shall specify that not less than one-half of such appropriation shall be paid over by the State Board of Health to the Health Department of Baltimore City, for use in the study and control of air pollution in and adjacent to the City of Baltimore."

(Formerly MTN 434) Pollution Control. Relates to a state pollution control agency. To Public Utilities Feb. 4.

Water Pollution. Concerning Sewage Authorities; permits such authorities to construct facilities for collecting and ultimately treating sewage outside its territory; permits contracts for joint action with other Sewage Authorities. To Counties & Municipalities Feb. 5.

NEW YORK

A.2130

(Same as S.2051) Air Pollution. Gives industrial board power to control discharge of dust, smoke, gases or fumes, to atmosphere by factories and places of work, in quantities detrimental to neighborhood or a nuisance; prohibits such discharge by factories including dust or impurities removed to protect employees. Labor Law, sections 23, 200, 299. To Labor Feb. 15.

Pollution Study. Directing an investigation of pollution and the pollution abatement program in the Clarion River watershed area. To Rules Feb. 6.

H.66

Smoke Control. Authorizes fourth class counties to impose smoke control regulations. Referred to Counties Feb. 6.

WYOMING	S.30	<u>Use of Water.</u> The state department of Public Health shall have oversight and care of inland waters, streams, etc. with respect to condition and use affecting public health and any pollution thereof which adversely affects livestock, wild life, fish or aquatic life.
