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PATENT SEARCH ON HAIR DRYERS

Dear Mr. Haffner:

Enclosed please find the results of my patent search on asbestos in hair dryers. Unfortunately, there was nothing of interest assigned to the corporations you had mentioned. It seems that the corporations, like Conair, are more interested in the design aspect of hair dryers, rather than the inventing part. I was able to locate some patents that disclosed the use of asbestos and mica, as summarized below.

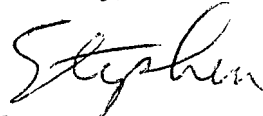

I have also enclosed a short history of electric hair dryers, which states that mica and asbestos were both commonly used. I also enclosed three trademark records for Conair: the Pro Style, the Pro Style 1200, and the Pistol Power 1200, all of which, I believe contained asbestos.

The important points from all of this are that both asbestos and mica (and perhaps other insulating materials) were known and used from the earliest hair dryer inventions. When asbestos was banned in hair dryers, they replaced it with mica. Therefore, if companies knew of or suspected asbestos was a hazard, it would have been a simple matter to replace it.
