The Doctor who diagnosis or analysis dis-ease without the proper instruments to determine the nature of the ailment and its cause is practicing a healing art but may miserably fail the poor patient who entrusts himself to his care. A man may be sincere and honest but may be totally ignorant of facts and the laws that control mans' destiny.

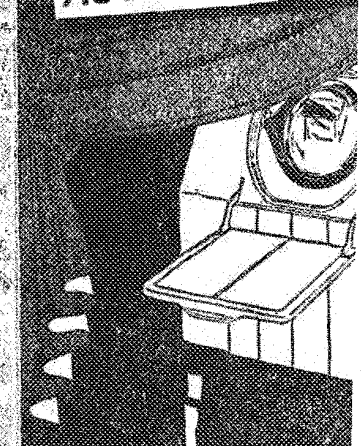
Last Sunday I made the statement that over 50% of all diagnosis is wrong. This I shall substantiate again by quoting Dr. Richard C. Cabot from the Mayo clinic in Rochester, Minn., that "in over 3000 post-mortems he had proven that substantially over 50% of the victims were diagnosed wrongly and by so doing had received the wrong mode of treatment." This grave error is not only committed by the Medical profession, but by all who treat the sick, who blindly set out to prescribe, operate, adjust or treat without first using instruments to ascertain facts that have been tried and tested and found sound.

Unfortunately, a great per cent of patients entering Doctors' offices, live in the illusion that a SCIENTIFIC EXAMINATION is not necessary before the Doctor proceeds to prescribe the mode of treatment for his particular ailment. They live in the grandeur that it is a waste of money, little realizing that if the Doctor submits to the patients wishes, that he, the Doctor, knows less about the patient than the patient himself and therefore miserably fails on the patient in question. This patient goes the rounds from Doctor to Doctor, always arriving at the same destiny—failure. For this offense there are two people responsible: the patient who expects the Doctor to do the wrong thing or goes to a Doctor who is not equipped to do the right thing, and the Doctor, who permitted the patient to "wear his shoes" but collected a fee for serving the patient wrongly.

In our office we refuse to treat, prescribe, adjust or render any health service until we have made a complete analysis with Scientific Instruments that are indisputable in finding the cause of their disease. In this manner we can exclude the old system of determining what to do for the patient from the symptoms, aches or pains he describes to his doctor for it is utterly impossible to accurately analyze and come to a logical conclusion by relying upon the patient's distress for a diagnosis.



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
