My dear Edgar:

With our recent discussion in mind, I have gone over rather carefully the proposed report blank gotten up by Mr. Tegner, and I have come to the conclusion that every question which he has presented in the form is pertinent for safety purposes. The first four questions seem to me a very satisfactory way of determining the adequacy of storage facilities. The next two give a very definite idea of the adequacy of the facilities in relation to the magnitude of commercial activity. The question on lead concentration per gallon is obviously our affair in view of the regulations. All the other questions refer specifically to precautionary measures and are very well devised in order to obtain the necessary information.

I am afraid that in my rather cursory examination of these questions previously, I did not give Mr. Tegner credit for having made a rather careful study of the matter and having rather cleverly devised a means of obtaining the information of which we are most in need.

I believe we can take the point of view that the filling out of this report represents a perfectly legitimate inquiry into the extent to which the regulations at present in force are being carried out.
