America made space age history early this month when it sent Alan B. Shepard, Jr., 115 miles into space to become the first American to blaze a trail into the cosmos. This modest first-step was hailed around the world, not so much for the magnitude of its accomplishment, but for the open-handed manner in which our country launched its first man in space. Nothing was concealed from the inquiring eyes of the press and thus we were willing to risk possible embarrassment and humiliation had our efforts met with failure. This is only as it should be in a democratic society. Our cover this month and a story beginning on page 12 describing a recent visit of our President and Secretary-Treasurer to a missile base is especially timely in view of Commander Shepard's historic 15-minute space flight. On our cover we see another instrument in our Nation's space cupboard—the TITAN missile. Currently the TITAN is performing a much less glamorous but unfortunately necessary job—that of protecting the peace. Currently the TITAN's two-stage 380,000 thrust rocket engines are being utilized solely as America's first line of defense. At strategic locations around the country, this missile is constantly on "the ready" to launch warheads at any aggressor who threatens the safety and security of this Nation. The reason for the rockets existence is to serve notice on any potential enemy that we will destroy them if attacked. In the language of the Cold War this missile is serving as a "deterrent" to war. If the TITAN accomplishes this mission, then it will have been worth all the tremendous amounts of money and time that has been spent on its development.

From the General President

SUPREME COURT

The Supreme Court of the United States on April 17, 1961 handed down two decisions which vitally affect the everyday lives of all the members of this International Union. On that day the Supreme Court overruled the National Labor Relations Board's decisions in the Brown-Olds Mountain Pacific cases, thereby upsetting the powder keg on which we have been living for the past few years. Both of these cases have been the subject matter of much correspondence between the International and its affiliated local unions and were covered in previous issues of the Asbestos Worker (April, 1958 and November, 1958).

BROWN-OLDS

The Brown-Olds case applied to the building trades unions the remedy which required that when found guilty of maintaining an illegal closed shop, the union (and employers) must pay, not only the damages to the individual employee discriminated against, but also must refund to all employees covered by the agreement all dues, assessments and other charges collected from the period starting 6 months prior to the date a charge was filed. This extreme remedy has been harmful because it has been costly in many instances, and the mere threat of it has been a cause to settle doubtful cases because of the extreme cost involved should the complainant be upheld.

The Supreme Court, in overruling this doctrine in the case of *Local*

60 Carpenters v. NLRB, held that the order was punitive rather than remedial and, therefore, was not within the power of the National Labor Relations Board unless there is evidence that the union membership was induced, obtained or retained in violation of the National Labor Relations Act.

Note that the remedy is not outlawed completely, but it can only apply in a case where it is shown that the individuals have actually been induced or coerced into joining the union.

MOUNTAIN PACIFIC

The Mountain Pacific Case provided that a hiring hall agreement would be discriminatory on its face unless the agreement specifically includes the following:

"... (1) Selection of applicants for referral to jobs shall be on a non-discriminatory basis and shall not be based on, or in any way affected by union membership, by-laws, rules, regulations, constitutional provisions, or any other aspect or obligations of union membership, policies or requirements.

(2) The employer retains the right to reject any job applicant referred by the Union.

(3) The Parties to the agreement post in places where notices to employees and applicants for employment are customarily posted, all provisions relating to the functioning of the hiring arrangement, including the safeguards that we deem essential to the legality of an exclusive hiring agreement. . . ."

You will recall that the General Counsel of the NLRB added that the actual *objective standards* used as a basis for referral must be spelled out in the written agreement.

In overruling this case, the Supreme Court held, in the case of *Local 357 Teamsters v. NLRB*, that the Board was legislating, which it did not have authority to do, and that it could not merely use the absence of these safeguards to determine that a hiring arrangement was illegal. The collective bargaining agreement in the case before the Supreme Court had a clause in it which provided that referral lists would be maintained by the union independent of whether an employee is a member or not. The court held that this clause could not be ignored and further that it would be *necessary that actual discrimination be proven*.

Note the decision does not sanction the operation of a hiring hall which discriminates based upon union membership. It is also clear that while there is no duty to follow the Mountain Pacific standards, any such hiring agreement should specifically prohibit discrimination on account of union membership.

EFFECT

It is too soon to fully realize all the implications of these two decisions, and the entire subject matter will, no doubt, be subject to further litigation in the Board and possibly in the Supreme Court. However, as this matter develops, the International will continue to inform our affiliated local unions of major developments.

General Executive Board, Annual Session

THE 1961 annual session of the General Executive Board convened at 9:30 A. M. at the Willard Hotel, Washington, D. C., Monday, March 20. Those present and answering roll call were: General President C. W. Sickles, International Vice Presidents George Rider, Malcolm Detlefs, Andrew Haas, Brooks Baker and J. Wayne Kelly; General Secretary-Treasurer Albert E. Hutchinson; International Assistants A. L. Hullinghorst and William Howell; and International Organizer John W. Hoff. (Vice President Hugh E. Mulligan was not in attendance at the Board meeting due to illness in the family. Vice President Michael H. Nicols had been excused from the opening day session in order to attend a meeting of the National Productivity Committee to which he had been named by Prime Minister Diefenbaker of Canada.)

Immediately following the roll call the Board voted to recess to proceed to the Sheraton Park Hotel and attend the opening session of the Seventh Annual Legislative Conference of the Building and Construction Trades Department at which we had a total of 48 Asbestos Workers in attendance.

Following the luncheon recess of the Legislative Conference our General Executive Board reconvened at the General Office at 2 P. M.

President Dave McCoy and Business Agent Frank A. Bishop of IPW No. 2, Barberton, Ohio appeared before the Board and discussed the affairs of their local. President Sickles counseled with them and agreed to take up their problems with the Local No. 84 delegates at the coming Central States Conference meeting in Detroit on April 29, 1961.

Attorney Joseph A. Sickles, on behalf of our General Counsel Carlton R. Sickles, reported on our legal problems.

The General Office over the past few months has been informed of certain difficulties in the Denver, Colorado territory and the General President had instructed the Business Agent to appear before the Board to answer these various charges. President Charles D. Ward, Vice President Lloyd Frost and Business Agent Leon Popick of Local No. 28, Denver, Colorado appeared before the Board in answer to the charges and to assure the Board that the future trade life of Local No. 28 would be conducted in a business-like manner. President Sickles assigned International Assistant William Howell to attend future meetings of Local No. 28 on his behalf and to further investigate the many complaints that have been received at the General Office with reference to the activities of certain members of Local No. 28 both on the job site and at Union meetings.

After the witnesses retired the Board further discussed the Denver situation and officially authorized President Sickles to, should the local fail to comply with the instructions and change their way of operating, revoke the charter and issue a new charter comprising those members who do want to affiliate and conduct

themselves and their activities in connection with working conditions and normal Union activities in a business-like manner.

Business Agent C. C. Berry of Local No. 56, Wood River, Illinois (Oil Refinery Maintenance Only), President William Bernard and Business Agent Thomas Walsh of Local No. 1, St. Louis, Mo., appeared before the Board in connection with a dispute between the two locals and after listening to representatives of both locals the case was referred to President Sickles for further investigation and decision.

The Board listened to reports from the representatives of the New York-New England and Middle Atlantic States Conferences in which they furthered their previous request for the privilege of sponsoring the next 1962 Convention of our International to be held in Atlantic City, N. J., advising that an assessment of \$10.00 per member had been placed on their membership to defray expenses incidental thereto. As a consequence of the practically unanimous vote of all of the locals of these two Conferences the Board agreed to their request, officially designating the city of Atlantic City, N. J. as the Convention City for the holding of our 20th Convention starting Tuesday, September 4, 1962.

The Board considered the subject matter of "Decals" for use on all prefabricated work done in our shops by our membership and these will be available for distribution to all local unions in the very near future. A detailed letter will be forwarded all local unions when same are ready for distribution.

The Secretary-Treasurer presented his financial report. President Sickles recommended to the Board an increase in the salary of International Assistant Howell from \$10,000 to \$12,500 per year, which was unanimously approved. It considered the daily allowance paid Board members and voted to revert back to the \$35.00 per day as called for in the International Constitution. The Board also reviewed the volume of work of the General Counsel and in light of the increase in work caused, among other things, by the passage of the Landrum-Griffin Act, recommended to the President that the retainer of the General Counsel be increased from \$12,000 to \$16,000 per year.

Secretary-Treasurer Hutchinson reported on the conduct of the affairs of Local No. 126, Calgary, Alta., Canada under local autonomy and mentioned several infractions of the International Constitution and By-Laws. After discussion this subject matter was referred to President Sickles for final disposition.

A request from Local No. 32, Newark, N. J. for extension of their charter to include the territory on the Jersey side of the Delaware River was discussed and request was denied.

A petition for charter issuance at Billings, Montana was considered and after discussion petition was denied.

A petition from Local No. 76, Albuquerque, New Mexico to extend their charter to include all of the State of New Mexico was considered and after discussion petition was denied.

A request from Local No. 125, Chattanooga, Tenn. for extension of their charter was discussed and request was denied.

The subject matter of Health Hazards was discussed and President Sickles reported on the possibility of an early meeting with people connected with the Medical Association for the purpose of running various tests on certain materials used by our membership in order to determine the extent of their contribution to lung cancer, silicosis, asbestosis, tuberculosis, etc.

The Code of Workmanship was discussed and no changes in the current Code were recommended at the present time by the Board.

The General Executive Board held a special "open house" for all local union representatives in the city attending the Seventh Annual Legislative Conference of the Building and Construction Trades Department. President Sickles reported on issues confronting our International at the present time and then answered questions posed by the representatives attending this "open house."

One of the issues discussed was the application of the Davis-Bacon Act for predetermining wage rates for federal construction and the delegates were advised to check in their communities and be sure to make proper filing of their agreements with the state and political sub-divisions, many of which have adopted a comparable system of setting up wage rate predeterminations for state, county or municipal construction work.

LOCAL NO. 25 HONORS ITS PIONEER MEMBERS

Asbestos Workers Local No. 25 celebrated its 50th or Golden Anniversary April 29, 1961 with a dinner-dance in the Veterans Memorial Building at which honors were heaped upon pioneer members. The affair was held in conjunction with a meeting of the Central States Conference.

Adding impact to both was the presence of President C. W. Sickles and Secretary-Treasurer Albert E. Hutchinson. A feature of the din-

ner-dance was the presentation of a 50 year diamond lapel pin to George Martens, the only known surviving charter member, who along with six other pioneers was presented the original charter for Local No. 25 on April 26, 1911.

Gold pins were presented to other members, whose seniority with the local ranged from 30 to 50 years.

The banquet was opened with a brief address of welcome by Mayor Louis C. Miriani following an in-

vocation by Father Clement Kern.

President Sickles outlined the history of the Asbestos Workers, formally known as the International Association of Heat and Frost Insulators and Asbestos Workers.

In addition, he congratulated Local No. 25 on its glowing achievements over the past 50 years and added his thanks to the pioneers, who had made such progress possible.

Building Trades Working for Passage Of Program Before Congress Recesses

AS this issue of your Journal went to press, the 87th session of Congress passed the half-way mark. Between now and recess time late this summer, building tradesmen are hoping that the Congress will take affirmative action on the full legislative program introduced by the Building Trades Department at its Seventh National Legislative Conference held on March 20-23, in Washington, D. C.

Asbestos Worker delegates to the conference, led by General President C. W. Sickles, were numbered among the 3,200 building tradesmen from 600 cities and all 50 states who spent two days hearing speeches from top Labor and Congressional leaders and two days visiting their Senators and Representatives from back home.

The keynote of the conference was set by Department President C. J. (Neil) Haggerty, who declared that the legislative program which is advocated is "not one designed with only the building tradesmen in mind, but rather one designed to benefit every segment of our society."

He pointed out that the 1961 legislative program of the Department included such broad objectives as Federal aid to school construction and teachers salaries, medical care for the aged through social security, minimum wage, housing and depressed areas legislation and amendments to the labor-management laws, including situs picketing.

Haggerty asked the delegates to be "direct and positive" in bringing the facts to members of Congress.

He pointed out that the building tradesmen, in addition to the rest of the nation, have felt the impact of unemployment and the economic recession.

"Our average unemployment for the year 1960 was 14 per cent," he said. "In February of 1960 we had 17.9 per cent unemployed in the construction industry; in February of 1961 we had 23.9 per cent unemployed."

Haggerty noted that "14 per cent of the gross national product in 1960 was spent on construction, a total of 70 billion dollars" and that if building tradesmen are put back to work a major step against fighting the

recession will have been successfully taken.

AFL-CIO President George Meany told the delegates that "America's number one domestic problem today is unemployment."

He added that "our nation must be the leader of the free world against the forces of despotism and slavery" but that "America must have a healthy economy if it is to exercise this leadership."

The AFL-CIO leader presented to the delegates what he called the "stark, naked facts." He said that if we were merely to hold our own—and this meant keeping the 5.5 million unemployed—we must find 25,000 new jobs a week.

Meany stressed that the Congress is closely divided between liberals and conservatives and that even with a liberal President "who gives every indication of fighting for the issues he promised during the campaign" the picture is not bright.

President Kennedy has set up five top-priority economic measures: depressed areas, minimum wage, housing, education, and medical care

for the aged. To date two have passed both houses of Congress and several are still buried in committee.

In a message to the conference, Kennedy paid tribute to the building tradesmen:

"I deeply believe your annual conferences play a most important part in the legislative process of our government. It is, in my opinion, most timely that more than three thousand delegates . . . are meeting with their respective representatives in Congress, conveying firsthand their ideas and suggestions on the legislative program presently before Congress.

"These are precarious times in the life of our nation both domestically and in our efforts to preserve peace, freedom and liberty throughout the world. In order to be successful in our efforts, it is of the utmost importance that all groups and individuals lend their assistance to the tremendous task that faces us.

"I am deeply thankful that the building tradesmen throughout the United States, once again in time of crisis, have pledged their full and complete cooperation."

Secretary of Labor Arthur J. Goldberg, in his speech to the delegates, advocated an extended program of apprenticeship training in the construction field.

"I feel it is imperative that this program be broadened to help provide additional training opportuni-

ties for those in your field who may desire it," he said. "A more liberal and stepped-up apprenticeship training program for your industry is an absolute necessity."

The Secretary said that it is estimated that the level of construction activity during the 1960's is expected to increase 40 to 50 per cent. He predicted an increase in building trade employees by 1.2 million, for a total of 4.2 million by 1970.

Louis Sherman, general counsel of the Department, told the delegates that the situs picketing bill is of extreme importance now. He warned that increasing amounts of work is going to nonunion contractors because they pay lower wages and thus can make lower bids.

Unless union craftsmen have the right to strike on construction sites, he noted, they will have no weapon to combat this pressure on their wage scale.

On the final day of the conference, delegates reported from the floor on their visits to their Congressmen and Senators on Capitol Hill. Overall, the consensus was the labor's legislative program is now hanging in the balance in a closely divided Congress.

Liberal, pro-labor members of Congress were outspoken in their support of the labor program but conservative Republicans and Southern Democrats were just as emphatic in opposition.

In between lies the balance of power—Senators and Representatives who declared:

"I haven't made up my mind";

"I want to study your material a little more" and

"I want to hear more from the people back home."

Strongest support was expressed for the situs picketing bill and the proposed amendments to the Davis-Bacon Act. Of the remainder of the department's program, such issues as minimum wage, medical care for the elderly, aid to distressed areas and housing were decidedly in the undecided category.

"Your reports indicate that a great deal more work must be done if we are to have any real progress in legislation," Department President C. J. (Neil) Haggerty said.

Assistant Secretary of Labor Jerry Holleman, a member of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers and former president of the Texas AFL-CIO, said that the legislative picture is "extremely critical." "Let's don't underestimate our opponents or take our friends for granted," he said. "We need every single vote in the Congress."

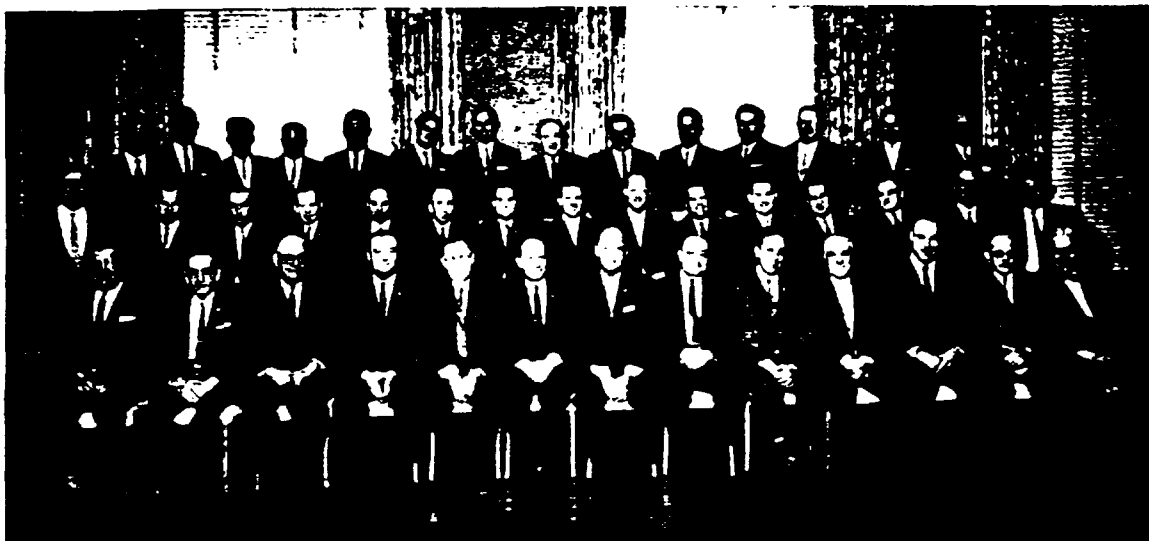
He urged the delegates to return home and have members "write letters to their Senators and Congressmen in their own words. A letter written by hand in simple terms is worth more than a hundred letters on fancy letterheads and typed by a secretary."

Meany Discounts 'Cheery' Forecasts

AFL-CIO Pres. George Meany has discounted the expected "cheery" predictions that the economic weather will improve as rapidly as the temperature climbs.

Warning that there will be no automatic "thaw," Meany said "that only thoughtful legislation promptly enacted can get the job [of solving the unemployment problem] started."

In a signed editorial in the May edition of *The American Federationist*, official monthly publication of the AFL-CIO, Meany said that official reports reflecting more people working and fewer people idle "just because the weather has improved," will tempt some to "think the worst is over."

He warned that continued mass unemployment is a "practical, immediate and universal problem."

The text of Meany's editorial follows:

"With the arrival of spring, we can expect to read cheery predictions that the economic weather will improve as rapidly as the temperature climbs. But will it really improve?

"One thing is sure, however, the memories of this bitter winter recession weather, with growing unemployment in an ever-increasing

number of industries and geographical areas, will not soon fade away.

"Certainly the official reports of the Dept. of Labor will reflect more people working and fewer people idle—just because the weather has improved. Those with jobs will be tempted to think the worst is over.

"But we in the labor movement must be more realistic.

"Even if the Dept. of Labor's figures are more favorable than expected, they will still show that some 65 out of every 1,000 American workers cannot find jobs. They will show a continuing "hard core" of close to 2 million workers who have been idle for 15 or more weeks. They will offer little indication that our economy can absorb an additional 1.25 million workers a year, on top of the undigested surplus we now have.

"Over the last decade we have failed to find jobs for a work-force that has increased by 800,000 a year. What will happen when the annual increase nearly doubles as it will shortly? What will happen as automation continues to put one button-pusher in the place of 50 or 500 wage earners?

"This is no academic problem. It is practical, immediate and uni-

versal. It concerns the proudest craftsman, smug in his conviction that no machine can touch him; for even if he's right, who will hire his skill? It concerns the most arrogant industrialist, sure he will be first with the best equipment; for who will buy his products? It concerns the most unworthy scientist, technicians or professional men, for they cannot survive without the backing of a prosperous community.

"The day has passed when we can have 'aristocrats' safe from the economic disaster of others. Unless our society works it will collapse; and it cannot work unless there is work for all.

"There are no islands of security for the favored few, no economic bomb shelters for anyone. We are in this together; and together we must grope our way toward a real and lasting solution.

"The rising temperatures will not thaw our economic problem. Only thoughtful legislation, promptly enacted, can get the job started.

"And the Congress is not going to act unless it feels a sense of urgency. An aroused citizenry, demanding action from its representatives, is the answer for America today."

President Sickles and Secretary Hutchinson Tour Titan Missile Base Site

SIXTEEN officials of the Building and Construction Trades Department, including President C. W. Sickles and Secretary-Treasurer Albert E. Hutchinson recently visited Air Force TITAN ICBM sites in the vicinity of Beale AFB, Marysville, California. The purpose of the visit was to familiarize the labor leaders with the problems involved in bringing a missile site into being.

The visit included a tour of TITAN emplacements presently under construction and briefings by Major General Thomas P. Gerrity, Commander of AMC's Ballistic Missile Center and other key Air Force officers responsible for the management of missile site activation.

The TITAN is the second Air Force ICBM now in development.

An accelerated development and testing phase is nearing successful completion and the first TITAN squadron will become operational next year.

Based on flexible design that allows for future improvement and refinement, TITAN will have a range of at least 6,325 statute miles and a speed of at least 15,000 MPH. The missile is being developed by an integrated Air Force-scientific-industrial team.

When the TITAN testing program is completed and the missile becomes operational within the Strategic Air Command, it will be emplaced in underground launching sites which afford maximum protection against nuclear attack. First of these sites will be on the Lowry Air Force Base bombing range southeast of Denver, Colorado. Other TITAN sites now undergoing construction are located at: Larson AFB, Moses Lake, Washington; Ellsworth AFB, Rapid City, South Dakota; Mountain Home AFB, Boise, Idaho; Davis-Monthan AFB, Tucson, Arizona; Little Rock AFB, Little Rock, Arkansas; Mc-

Connell AFB, Wichita, Kansas; Griffiss AFB, Rome, New York.

The TITAN was recommended as a second ICBM (Atlas was first) program in 1955 by the Strategic Missiles Evaluation Committee under the chairmanship of Dr. John von Neumann. Purpose of the TITAN program was to provide a two-stage ICBM, based on projected technical advances, that would carry the heaviest possible payload over the greatest distance.

TITAN is being developed by the Air Research and Development Command's Air Force Ballistic Missile Division, commanded by Major General Osmond J. Ritland. The Air Materiel Command's Ballistic Missile Center under Major General Thomas Gerrity is responsible for procurement, production, logistics planning and site activation.

The Air Force is also developing an advanced model of the TITAN ICBM, capable of carrying a heavier load and with a greatly reduced reaction time.

Known as the "TITAN II", this improved weapon system will be equipped with a larger missile which may be launched directly from its

underground silo, only a few seconds after the order to fire is given. This advancement results from the development of a TITAN which can be fueled with storable liquid propellants. Storable liquids will permit the advanced TITAN to be fueled and kept in a ready-firing condition for long periods of time.

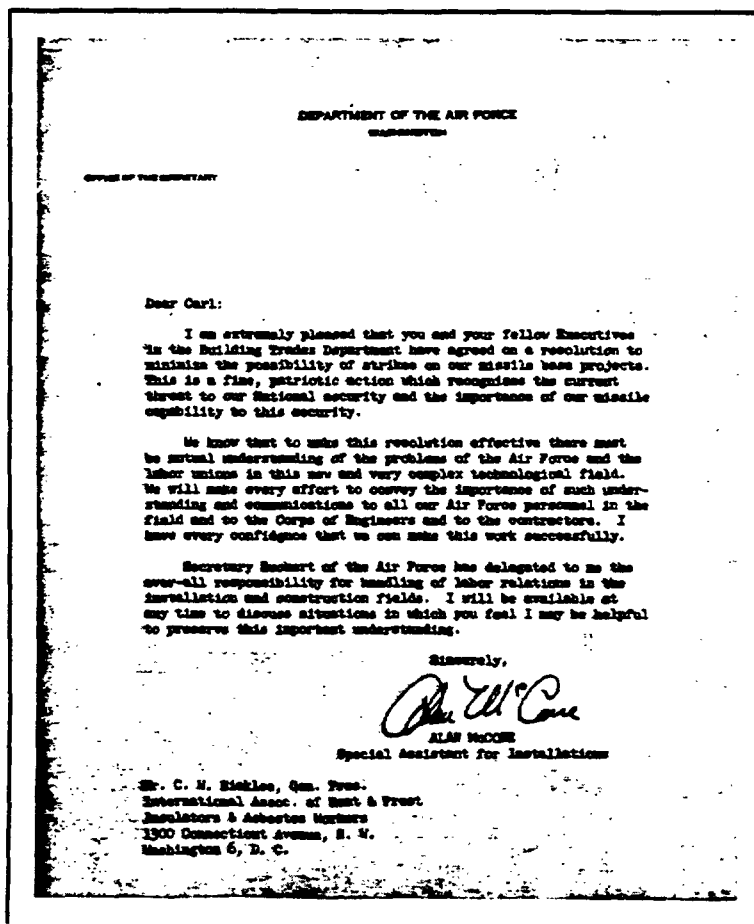
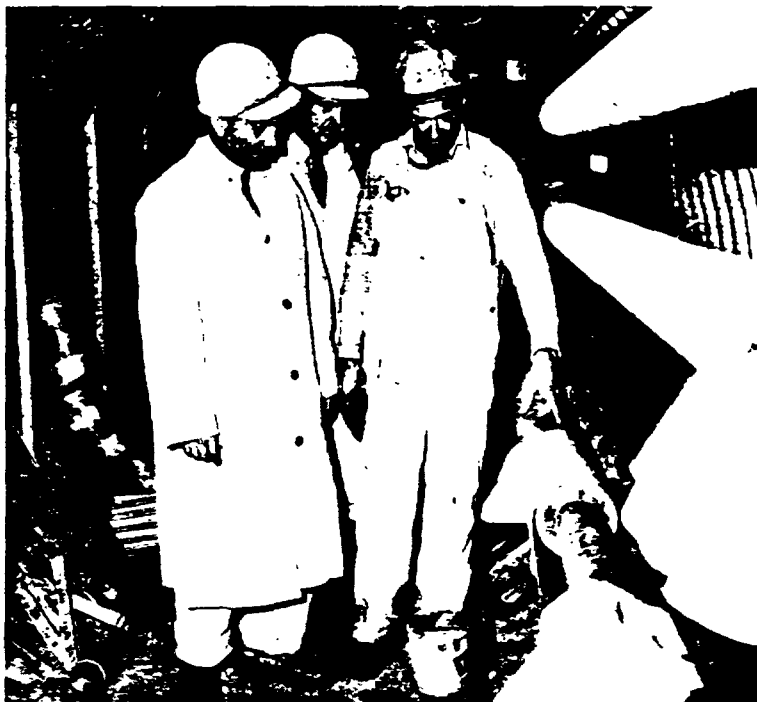
In addition to these advancements, TITAN II will be directed to its target by a self-contained, all-inertial guidance system. This system, which cannot be jammed by any known method, provides the capability of launching the entire TITAN II force in "salvo".

In operation, the rocket engine of the first stage boosts the TITAN to altitude and then shuts off. The first stage then separates from the rest of the missile. The second stage fires next and continues to push the payload to greater altitudes and distances. When the second stage finishes its job, it also separates, from the re-entry vehicle or nose cone. The latter follows a ballistic trajectory to its destination.

The first flight test TITAN was launched successfully on February 6, 1959. Less than 90 days later, after two more completely favorable test flights, the first attempt to separate the first and second stages in flight was also successful.

In the space of less than two years, the TITAN has progressed testwise from the initial flight articles to the operational prototype missile with all major subsystems

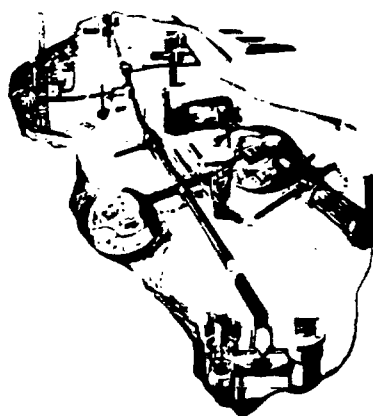

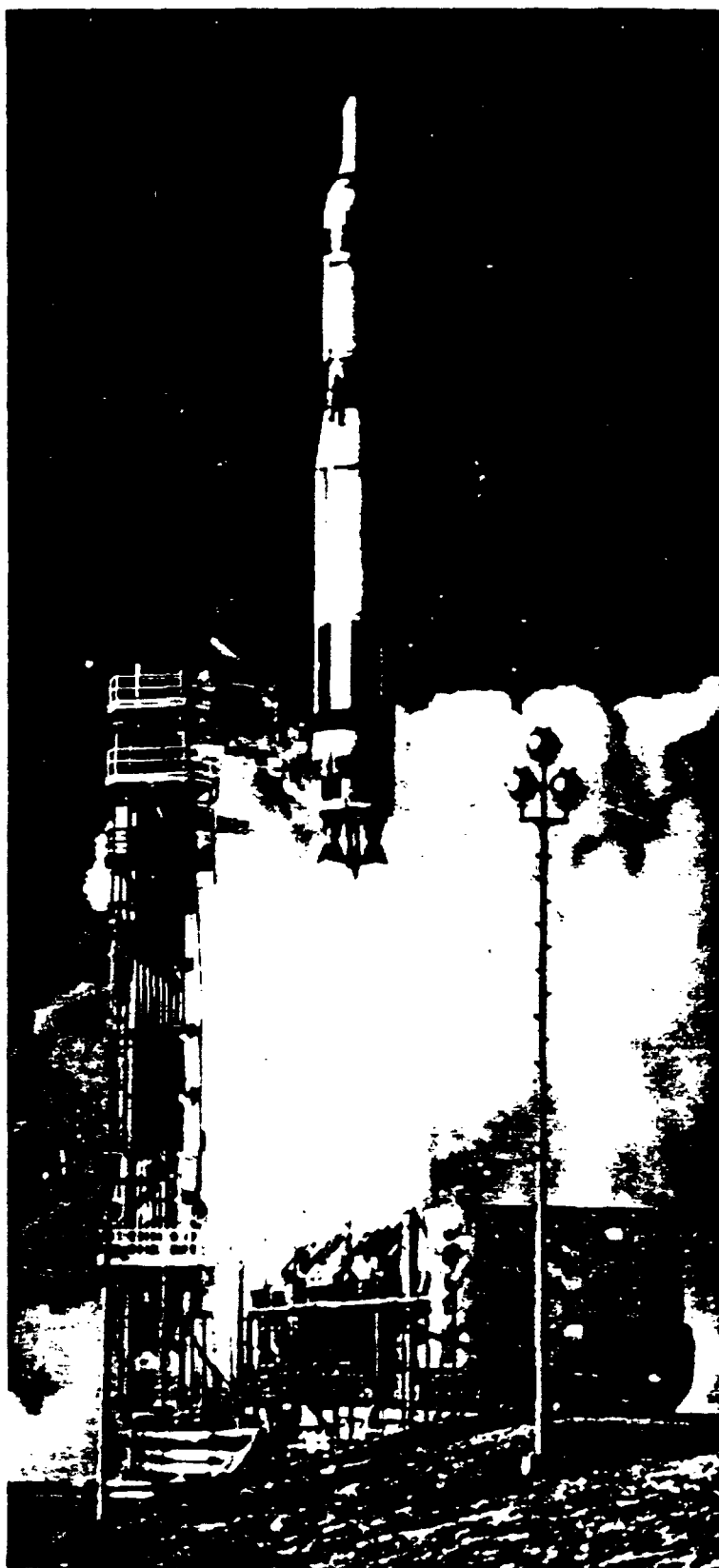

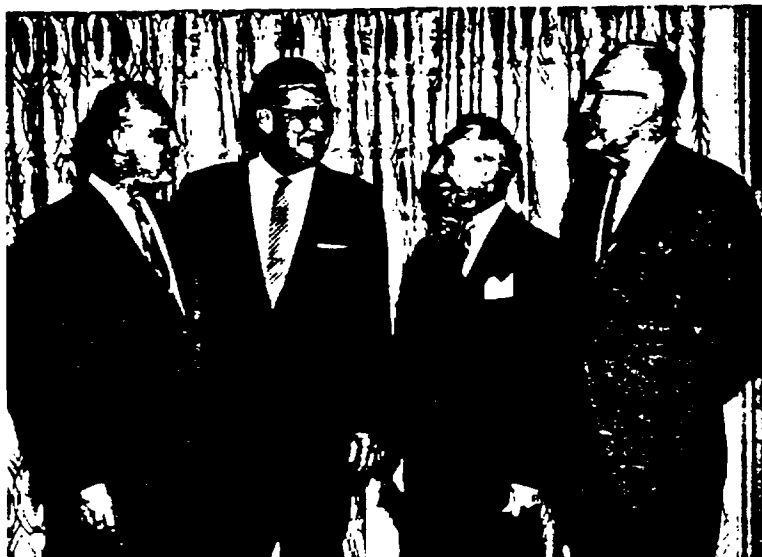

J., James Mulhern and James F. Dwyer, Jr.; Local No. 38, Wilkes-Barre and Scranton, Pa., Herbert C. Bressler and David M. Powell; Local No. 42, Wilmington, Del., Alfonso V. Walker and Robert E. Brittingham; Local No. 65, York, Pa., Richard E. Liek and George DeLallo; Local No. 71, Allentown, Pa., Julius E. Birkas, Jr.; Local No. 83, Norfolk, Va., Jack D. Walker and Robert E. Brittingham of Local No. 42, with Colwell Gibbons and Theodore Ryan as alternates.

The minutes of the last regular meeting were accepted as published

in the February issue of *THE ASBESTOS WORKER*.

Delegate Rust of Local No. 2 reported a membership of 182 Mechanics and 35 Improvers. Wage rate \$4.15 with Improvers on percentage. Fringes include 10¢ Welfare, 10¢ Pension and 7½% Vacation and Holiday Fund. Agreement on wages expires July 31, 1961 and on fringes July 31, 1962. Present conditions are good but in a slowing-up process and a pick-up is not foreseen until the fall of the year. Due to this condition some jurisdictional difficulties are being experienced with related crafts.

Delegate Zinser of Local No. 11 reported a membership of 184 Mechanics and 46 Improvers. Wage rate \$4.10 with Improvers on percentage. Fringes include 12½¢ Welfare and 30¢ Vacation. Agreement expires June 30, 1962. Due to bad weather present conditions are only fair. The future looks good with all types of work coming along.

Delegate Haas of Local No. 14 reported a total membership of 338 including Improvers. Wage rate \$4.00 with Improvers on percentage. Fringes are 10¢ Welfare, 10¢ Pension and 20¢ Vacation Funds. Their agreement expires July 14, 1961. At the present conditions are slow and an upturn is not expected for from six to eight weeks, and until then assistance from sister locals will be necessary. Prospects for the summer months could become good.

Delegate Nichols of Local No. 24 reported a membership of 183 Mechanics and 28 Improvers. Wage rate is \$4.35, which includes a 10¢ Pension Fund with Improvers on percentage. Fringes—10¢ Welfare. Agreement expires June 30, 1961. The present work load is slow due to the inclement winter that was experienced. The future prospects look good. He expressed appreciation to the locals who were in a position to help out during the past winter.

Delegate Mulhern of Local No. 32 reported a membership of 290 Mechanics and 70 Improvers. Wage

rate \$4.35 with Improvers on 60% and 80%. Fringes—12¢ Welfare, 10¢ Pension and 4% Vacation Funds. Agreement expires September 17, 1962. Present conditions are only fair due mostly to past weather conditions but the future prospects are good. The "Decal" system now being used on pre-fab fittings is working out very well. The jurisdictional problem over stud welding was, with assistance from the General Office, solved and the work reverted to our craft.

Delegate Dwyer of Local No. 32 reported that a definite date of October 21, 1961 has been set for the 50th Anniversary of Charter issuance Dinner-Dance to be held at the Hotel Essex House, Newark, N.J., in conjunction with the fall meeting of the Conference.

Delegate Bressler of Local No. 38 reported a membership of 29 Mechanics and 8 Improvers. Wage rate \$3.62½ with Improvers on percentage. Fringes—10¢ Welfare. Agreement expires June 30, 1961. Present conditions are slow due to the adverse weather conditions of the past several weeks. An upturn is foreseen and future conditions look good, possibly as soon as six to eight weeks hence. He also expressed thanks to the locals that helped out during their lull.

Delegate Walker of Local No. 42 reported a membership of 64 Mechanics and 15 Improvers. Wage rate \$4.00 with Improvers on percentage. Fringes—10¢ Welfare, 10¢ Pension and 20¢ Vacation. Agreement expires July 14, 1961. Present work load is slow due to past weather conditions. With a noticeable improvement in the work load conditions will improve in the coming months, industrial expansion warrants this forecast.

Delegate Liek of Local No. 65 reported a membership of 47 Mechanics and 15 Improvers. Wage rate \$3.52½ with Improvers on percentage. Fringes—10¢ Welfare and 10¢ Pension. Agreement expires June 30, 1961. Present conditions are very good and additional

manpower can be used. With a continued volume of work coming along future prospects will remain good.

Delegate Birkas of Local No. 71 reported a membership of 32 Mechanics and 9 Improvers. Wage rate \$3.55 with Improvers on percentage. Fringes—10¢ Welfare and 20¢ Vacation. Agreement expires September 1, 1961. Present work load is good but also slowing down. Future prospects seem fair at this time.

Delegate Coday of Local No. 83 reported a membership of 123 Mechanics and 7 Improvers. Wage rate \$3.57½ with Improvers on percentage. Fringes—10¢ Welfare. Agreement expires June 30, 1962. Present conditions are slow and nothing in the foreseeable future will provide full employment with the result that assistance will be a necessity.

Delegate Dailey of Local No. 85 reported a membership of 20 Mechanics and 4 Improvers. Wage rate \$4.00 with Improvers on percentage. Fringes—10¢ Welfare, 10¢ Pension and 20¢ Vacation. Agreement expires July 14, 1961. Present work load is slow and with only work of the small type coming along the future prospects will remain slow.

Delegate Parker of Local No. 88 reported a membership of 74 Mechanics and 19 Improvers. Wage rate \$3.57½ with Improvers on percentage. Fringes—10¢ Welfare. Agreement expires July 1, 1962. Present conditions are slow and with only the general variety of work coming along the future prospects will remain slow.

Delegate Kopp of Local No. 89 reported a membership of 31 Mechanics and 8 Improvers. Wage rate \$4.00 with Improvers on percentage. Fringes—10¢ Welfare, 10¢ Pension and 20¢ Vacation. Agreement expires July 14, 1961. Present work load is still good but two of the large jobs are very near completion with a result that a leveling off will be at hand. The future prospects seem good with numerous bread and butter jobs carrying the load.

Delegate Dalton of Local No. 100 reported a membership of 21

Mechanics and 2 Improvers. Wage rate \$3.55½ with Improvers on percentage. Agreement expires June 30, 1962. Work load at present is only fair and also tapering off. A lull is expected to last for approximately two months. Future prospects seem good with industrial expansion predominating the outlook.

The Secretary reported that the annual assessment has been received from Locals 11, 24, 32, 38, 65, 83, 85, 88, 89 and 100.

A discussion pertaining to the International Convention, to be held in Atlantic City, N.J., in September of 1962, was held and President Andrew T. Haas and Secretary-Treasurer Stephen J. Kopp as Conference Officers were delegated to serve on the joint Committee on Arrangements with their counterparts from the New York-New England Conference together with General President Carl W. Sickles to formulate plans for this joint venture. President Sickles advised that soon after the forthcoming session of the General Executive Board, at which time official sanction will be requested for designating Atlantic City as the location for the September 1962 Twentieth Convention, all participating locals will be advised so that financial obligations can be resolved. President Sickles further suggested that shortly after the General Executive Board has endorsed the Convention city that a joint meeting of the full committee would be arranged, possibly in conjunction with the next Middle Atlantic States Conference meeting in Atlantic City, to review previous arrangements and proceed with consideration of further detailed activities and arrangements of the committees in the future.

During the delegates' reports both President Sickles and Secretary Hutchinson gave interesting and enlightening talks and instructions on craft issues, stressing the necessity of supplying an adequate manpower when demanded; bonding provisions in the Landrum-Griffin law; and a forthcoming meeting with the Sheet Metal International in another effort to resolve jurisdiction. They also advised that all

locals will be forwarded a listing of recognized national contractors.

A discussion was held on the advisability of advancing the start of Conference meetings to 9 a.m. so that delegates would have more time to confer with International Officers on matters of local interest. It was decided that henceforth this procedure would be followed.

With all business transacted adjournment was voted until the Saturday June 3, 1961 meeting which will be held in the Traymore Hotel in Atlantic City, New Jersey.

Delegate Jack K. Oualline, Local No. 113, reported membership of 72 Mechanics and 12 Improvers. Work load slow at present and future also slow.

Delegate J. V. Baker, Local No. 114, reported membership of 37 Mechanics and 10 Improvers. Work load fair at the present time and future outlook also fair.

Conference President Brooks Baker called attention to the fact that eight Local Union contracts would expire June 30, 1961.

General President C. W. Sickles addressed the delegates and placed particular emphasis on the importance of giving Contractors 90 days' notice prior to the expiration date of the Agreement. He stated the Federal Mediation Board must also be notified 60 days prior to the expiration date of the Agreement. After the Agreement is signed, 3 actual signed copies should be forwarded the General Office, one

of which will be forwarded to the Department of Labor, Office of the Solicitor. Copies should also be filed with state and municipal authorities in instances where wage rates are predetermined by these agencies.

President Sickles advised the delegates of an early April meeting in Washington, D. C. between the Sheet Metal Workers' International and our International.

President Sickles instructed the delegates on the proper procedure to be followed in reporting maintenance contract grievances with settlements to be made on International level.

The Financial Committee reported a balance in the Treasury of \$10,873.00 as of March 23, 1961, and recommended purchasing U. S. Government Bonds in the amount of \$3,750.00 issue price. President Sickles suggested the Committee reconsider this recommendation with the possibility of increasing the amount. The Committee agreed to postpone its recommendation until the afternoon session.

Meeting recessed for lunch.

Afternoon Session:

Conference President Baker informed all delegates that charges of an inter-local nature must contain complete details in every respect before being mailed to headquarters in Washington.

The Financial Committee recommended purchasing \$7,500.00 of U. S. Government Bonds, having a Maturity value of \$10,000.00. The delegates voted unanimously to accept this recommendation.

President Baker announced the Albuquerque, New Mexico delegates had requested that the next Conference be held in their city on the fourth Saturday in September, 1961. Request granted.

President Sickles answered questions asked by delegates dealing with interpretations and laws covering the actions of Local Unions.

At this point President Sickles introduced International Assistant William Howell who has been assigned to our Southwest area. Brother Howell informed the delegates that he would do all in his power to assist each Local with any

problems. He also stated his intention to attend as many local union meetings each month as possible.

There being no further business meeting adjourned at 3:50 P.M.

Brother John Grob, Sr. attended in his capacity as the Conference Sergeant-at-Arms. Brothers Frank Bishop and Dave McCoy of Insulation Production Workers Local No. 2 sat in as guests of the Conference.

General President Carl Sickles and General Secretary-Treasurer Albert E. Hutchinson were also in attendance representing the International Association.

It was moved that minutes of the previous meeting be approved as printed in the Asbestos Worker. Motion carried.

There being no objection, the letter from the General Office re Bonding was ordered received and filed and its contents noted.

The Chair referred to new business the letter from Local No. 47 requesting they be considered as the host local for the Spring 1962 meeting of the Conference.

It was moved that the financial report be accepted as submitted by the Secretary. Motion carried.

Delegate Reilly of Local No. 3 reported a total membership of 200 with 186 Mechanics and 14 Improvers. They have 140 members working in the home territory with six members on Traveling Cards. They have agreed on a three year contract calling for a 15 cent per hour increase in wages each year. Present work is slow and future work looks slow.

Delegate Eby of Local No. 8 reported a membership of 92 Mechanics and 18 Improvers—a total membership of 110. They have 105 members working in the home territory with three on Traveler. The Agreement expires May 31, 1961. They are negotiating with their employers. Work at the present is slow with the future work load expected to be good.

Delegate Grob of Local No. 18 reported a membership of 134 Mechanics and 24 Improvers—a total membership of 158. All members are at work with 20 Travelers working in the territory. Their Agreement expires June 30, 1961. Work at present is fair with the future expected to be about the same.

Delegate Dudis of Local No. 25 reported a total membership of 296 members with 255 Mechanics, and 41 Improvers. They have 271 members working at home with one member on Traveler. There are five Travelers working in the territory. Their Agreement expires May 31, 1961 and they are currently negotiating a new Agreement.

Delegate Kershner of Local No. 35 reported 90 members with 76 Mechanics and 14 Improvers. They have 87 employed in the home territory. Their Agreement, which expires May 31, 1962, calls for an increase in wage rate to \$4.10 per hour as of June 1, 1961. The present work load is good with the future prospects good.

Delegate Gerhardt of Local No. 37 reported a total of 103 members with 88 Mechanics and 15 Improvers. They have 70 members employed in home territory with 28 members away from home on Travelers. Their Agreement expires March 31, 1962. Work at present is slow, but expect it to become fair in the near future. Local No. 37 wishes to thank the sister locals for helping take care of its members during their slack period.

Delegate Miller of Local No. 41 reported a membership of 46 with 39 Mechanics and seven Improvers. They have 59 members employed in the territory with two members on Travelers and 15 Travelers working in the territory. Their Agreement expires June 30, 1961. Work at the present is good with future prospects fair.

Delegate Chandler of Local No. 44 reported a total of 100 members with 82 Mechanics and 18 Improvers. They have 54 employed in the home territory with 21 members away from home on Traveler. Their Agreement expires May 31, 1962. Work at the present is slow and the

future work in the territory is expected to be slow.

Delegate Tanner of Local No. 45 reported a membership of 94 with 81 Mechanics and 13 Improvers. They have 36 members employed in the home territory with 27 members on Traveling Cards. Their Agreement expires June 1, 1962. Work at present is slow, but they expect a fair amount of work in the near future.

Delegate Harrison of Local No. 46 reported a membership of 154 with 118 Mechanics and 32 Improvers. They have 54 members working in the home territory with 48 members on Travelers. Their Agreement expires November 16, 1962. Work at the present is slow and future prospects for work in the territory are poor.

Delegate Wood of Local No. 47 reported a total membership of 217 with 188 Mechanics and 29 Improvers. They have 304 men employed in the territory including 76 Travelers. Nine of Local No. 47's members are away from home on Traveling Cards. Work at the present is good with future prospects also good. Their Agreement expires June 30, 1961 and they have started negotiations. The Local has adopted a policy of taking five new Improvers into the Local each month until the Improver to Mechanic ratio is brought into line.

Delegate Elmore, Jr. of Local No. 51 reported a membership of 100 with 88 Mechanics and 12 Improvers. They have 70 employed in the home territory and 34 members on Travelers. Their Agreement expires October 1, 1962. They will receive a fifteen cent per hour increase in wages October 1, 1961 a portion of which will be used for pension contribution. Work at the present is slow with the future work load expected to be fair.

Delegate Calkins of Local No. 75 reported a membership of 35 with 30 Mechanics and five Improvers. They have 31 employed in the home territory with four members on Traveling Cards. Their Agreement, which expires June 1, 1962, provides for a fifteen cent per hour increase to be added to present vacation contribution. Present work load is slow and future prospects for work in the territory are fair.

Delegate Hutchinson reported a membership of 79 with 20 Mechanics and nine Improvers. They have 40 employed in the home territory with 30 members away from home on Traveling Card. Their Agreement expires August 1, 1962. Work at the present is slow with future work expected to be slow.

Delegate Wilks of Local No. 80 reported a membership of 99 with 80 Mechanics and 19 Improvers. They have 115 employed in the home territory, 15 of whom are Travelers. Their Agreement expires May 31, 1962. Effective June 1, 1961 the wage rate will be increased to \$4.05 per hour. Work at present is fair with future outlook the same.

Delegate Rice of Local No. 84 reported a membership of 56 with 52 Mechanics and 4 Improvers. They have 30 employed in the home territory with 12 members away from home on Traveling Card. The Agreement expires June 30, 1961. Work at the present is slow with future work prospects about the same.

President Sickles gave advice on various matters as brought out in delegates reports.

At the conclusion of the delegates' reports Secretary Hutchinson spoke on some of the things of interest to our craft which were brought to his attention during his assignments away from the General Office.

President Sickles was given the floor and spoke at length advising the delegates on several subjects. He advised that the local unions should check with the General Office for advice on the language to be used in their Agreements in connection with vacation and pension funds. Also, they should be sure and notify Federal and State Mediation agencies 30 to 60 days before their Agreements expire to protect the right to strike if such action becomes necessary.

He suggested that one way to protect the payment of wages and fringe benefits would be to insert a clause in the Agreement requiring employers to take out a bond covering such payments as recommended at the March, 1960 General Executive Board session.

He stated that it was his considered opinion that collective

bargaining should be conducted between the interested parties from within our industry and lawyers should be called in only to help with the language after the Agreement has been reached.

Union officers, he stated, should make sure that the words "preparation and distribution of materials" be included in the Article in the Agreement covering our jurisdiction.

Unions should beware of any proposal which would, in effect, limit the Agreement coverage to a 30 mile radius. A suggestion along these lines, he warned, could be a trap. Several of our locals have been talked into making changes in the model form of Agreement much to their sorrow.

He requested that anyone with specific information relative to molded fittings and/or pressed metal covers for fittings, send samples and literature to the General Office.

He made a report on the progress made to date in the talks with the Sheet Metal Workers International.

A general discussion was held with various affiliated local delegates outlining their unsatisfactory experience in manning jobs for the Buckeye Insulation Co. of Columbus, Ohio. All delegates agreed that they would pay particular attention to future operations being performed by this company and the manner in which they are being executed.

It was moved and supported that Local No. 47's request to be the host Local for the Spring, 1962 Conference meeting be granted, this meeting to coincide with their 25th anniversary. Motion carried.

The next semi-annual meeting of the Central States will be in the Fall of 1961 in Evansville, Indiana. The exact date will be determined later.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned at 1 p.m.
