FINDINGS OF FACT

1. Roy Thorsted, an insulation installer, born December 1,
1926, was employed by Plant Asbestos Company and Armstrong Cork
Company for various periods of time as indicated by the record, and
alleges that he sustained an injury arising out of and occurring in
the course of his employments, consisting of an asbestosis.

2. Applicant did not sustain any injury arising out of or
occurring in the course of his said employments.

3. The disability of which applicant complains was not
proximately caused, or caused at all, by any injury arising out of
or occurring in the course of his employments, or by his employment.

ORDER

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that applicant take nothing by reason
of his claim asserted in this proceeding.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the Amended Claim of Line filed
herein by the Department of Employment on April 27, 1959, be and
the same is hereby disallowed.

The Standard Accident Insurance Company has closed their file on the captioned case. No payments were made and the only expense to them was \$183.00 for legal services.

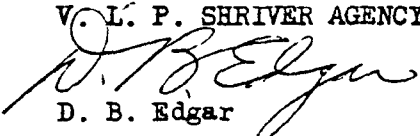

REPORT OF REFERENCE

The employee, an insulation installer, born December 1, 1926, claims to have sustained an asbestosis as a result of employment with various defendants.

ISSUES: Occupation

GERALD L. CRINSHAW, M.D., testified on behalf of the applicant in substance as follows:

He is duly licensed to practice medicine in the State of California. His specialty is diseases of the chest and thoracic surgery. He first saw the applicant on December 29, 1956, in his office and received a history as indicated in his report and the hospital records.

He based his conclusion on the pathology report of Dr. Watson and his clinical examination. Applicant has a pathology caused by the inhalation of asbestos fibers, working with a product containing 65% magnesium and 15% asbestos. His experience indicated that if asbestos particles are sufficient in amount, some will cause scarring of the lungs. At this time he can not state whether or not there will be a progression but if there is no further exposure, there might not be any major disability. His advice would be against further exposure to asbestos. He can work at his old job by using inhalators or protective masks. He does not know how much the fibrosis will progress in the future. The lung has a fantastic reserve. Only time will tell if the present condition will work without further exposure.

He was paid \$ 5.00 for his testimony.

The surgery was for diagnostic purposes. At the time of the surgery, the applicant was not disabled. The work history was taken by the nurse after he had seen the patient. The size of the particles of asbestos and the concentration were important.

When he last examined the applicant on October 5, 1959, the vital capacity averaged about 4 liters, and 75 liters per minute is not far off from normal. There may also be a chemical action in asbestosis cases but in asbestosis it is only suspected, whereas the chemical action is known in silicosis.

THORSTED - 2

There was emphysema. He can not give the size of the particles necessary to cause asbestosis. They will cause a loss of elasticity of the lung. He has seen two other cases of asbestosis, fellow employees of the applicant, one of which was much more severe.

His charges are set forth in the bill. They are in accordance with the custom of the county.

Six fibers per cubic centimeter are a small amount. History is an important factor in the diagnosis. What makes it conclusive is the pathologist's report. Even if he had not known of the two fellow employees having asbestosis, his conclusion in this case would have been the same. He does not know the exact work history of the other employees involved but understands they worked with asbestos and fiberglass over ten years. He would say that exposure to fiberglass plays no part in applicant's disability. He does not know how much time was spent with fiberglass and how much time with asbestos. *

The last X-ray was taken October 3, 1954. His X-ray reading differs from the readings of Dr. Hinshaw. The asbestosis is not severe but in working he must have a proper inhalator. The symptoms can be indicative of many other diseases. The diagnosis was positive after surgery. A number of particles would not be uniform throughout the lung. He does perform major surgery for diagnostic purposes and this is very definitely the practice of other specialists. It is an accepted surgical procedure.

HEARING OF DECEMBER 3, 1954:

H. CORWIN HINSHAW, M.D., testified in behalf of defendants in substance as follows: His specialty is internal medicine, especially diseases of the chest for the last 15 years. He examined the applicant on September 3, 1954. After the examination he examined the tissue removed at the time of the surgery. He also reviewed the X-rays and the report of Dr. Crenshaw, and the pathologist's report as contained in the report of Dr. Crenshaw. The original report of Dr. Watson, the pathologist, of October 1, 1954, does not change the original opinion expressed in his report of September 10, 1954, and September 20, 1954. The history contained in his reports was dictated in applicant's presence. He, himself, finds no asbestosis, and applicant does not have asbestosis now nor did he have asbestosis before. He is not disabled. Dr. Watson, the pathologist, found no inflammatory tissue, but some sparse asbestos particles, but these bodies did not produce any disease.

Dr. Bowman in the pathologist's report and the hospital records indicates some scarring in the section that he examined. Dr. Watson does not find any such scarring. He does not believe that he saw the report of Dr. Bowman before but the doctor did not indicate the cause. In any event, this report does not refute normal breathing capacity nor the lack of X-rays evidence of asbestosis or clinical evidence of asbestosis.

THORATED - 2

Thereports of the two pathologists are not in agreement. Dr. Watson found fibers. Dr. Bowman found none. The fibers found were very few. Such fibers are not easily missed. Dr. Watson was very definite as to the finding of no pathology in the lung tissue. It is reasonable to assume that if fibers were not found by Dr. Bowman, that the pathology he found was not caused by asbestos. Dr. Bowman made no finding of asbestosis or a disabling lung condition but this witness can not state the cause of the conditions found by Dr. Bowman. With a history given by a doctor, then there must be an X-ray examination. Previous X-rays must also be studied, if available, as well as the medical history. If these matters demonstrate a pneumoconiosis, there should be a breathing capacity test. Then if there is no definite diagnosis, it would not be unusual to make a biopsy. With negative findings on X-rays as in this case, he, himself, would not have performed a lung biopsy but there are others who would.

Fees for biopsy vary. Certain fee schedules, such as the Industrial Accident Commission, the minimal fees are not adhered to by many doctors. The Medical Association has a fee schedule. He does not know what is reasonable or customary, however, he, himself, would not have recommended the procedure in this case. The finding of diminution of energy is not diagnostic. Fatigue and pain across the chest are not necessarily symptoms of asbestosis. Shortness of breath after activity is one of the symptoms but not specifically of asbestosis. The shortness of breath on activity is generally diagnostic of some lung or heart disorder.

Cough and production of yellowish sputum also is diagnostic but not of any specific lung disorder. With the history of shortness of breath on activity, cough producing yellowish sputum and other findings and clinical history in reference to Mr. Thorated would not lead him to make a tentative diagnosis of asbestosis. He would then proceed with further tests. A lung biopsy is one method of getting a diagnosis. It is major surgery, not minor. If he suspected a lung disease for which treatment would benefit, he would perform a biopsy.

The report of Dr. Bowman was not totally consistent with asbestosis. His only explanation of the difference between the report of Dr. Watson and that of Dr. Bowman is that they cut a different portion of the lungs.

From the record the amount of lung tissue removed is about the size of half the palm of one's hand, and this, of course, is enough for many slides. In general all portions of the lung will be similarly affected but they will not be entirely uniform as a finding of fibers of asbestos. He, himself, thinks that the X-rays that he reviewed are normal, although Dr. Crenshaw thought them to be abnormal. He does not think that Dr. Crenshaw's findings are reasonable if they looked at the same films. There is no way of resolving scar tissue or the destruction caused by typical asbestosis. The progress is irreversible. The lung function tests that he took were quite normal. Forced breathing exercises will clear out mucus in blocked areas, but they will clear out themselves if the patient breathes deeply. There is remarkably little actual increase in lung capacity following forced breathing, although there often is a marked sense of well being, following such treatment.

THORSTED - A

The additional information just obtained from the hospital record which contains a history of excessive smoking of about 30 cigarettes a day, led him to conclude that any one who smokes that many cigarettes would be entitled to all the symptoms that Thorsted had. When he took the history, he only received a history of smoking a few cigarettes a day. It is much more likely that bronchiectasis caused the pathology found by Dr. Bowman as Dr. Bowman found no asbestos fibers.

The symptom history in the first paragraph of Dr. Crenshaw's report on May 25, 1959, is indicative of many lung diseases or none at all.

When the sputum is yellowish, it indicates an infection of some sort. Before a biopsy he would test the sputum but would not be critical if it were not done.

The section referred to by Dr. Bowman was probably the whole section. A description of the specimen as a whole is that of normal lung tissue.

The operative findings of Dr. Crenshaw does not mean much to the witness.

Ordinarily, asbestosis is a progressive condition as long as there is continued exposure. It is not like silicosis where there is progression without further exposure. Although there is some dispute in this respect, it is in accordance with British opinion. Asbestos fibers will produce irritation, inflammation and fibrosis. Fibrosis causes the lung to become rigid and less capable of expansion. It is probably a mechanical thing as distinct from a chemical irritation as is caused by silicosis. In silicosis the particles are very minute and they are retained in the lung, and continue to irritate the lung. Perhaps many thousands of fibers are not harmful in the lung but breathing millions would, and certain persons would be more susceptible than others. There is no evidence of any mechanical irritation of the lung in respect to the tissues where they were found. Asbestos fibers can be expelled. In the studies of Dr. Sanders he found no progression but did not section any improvement over the period.

APPLICANT testified in substance as follows:

He has been working with asbestos materials for 13 or 14 years, applying insulation on water lines and boilers. He uses the asbestos material in block form, and the form that fits the pipe. The blocks will usually run three feet long, and the thickness is in accordance with the specifications. The pipe forms are the same length and they are cut with saws and the cutting causes a fine powder, and sometimes causes dust to the extent that a person is covered with the dust, and his hair becomes white. He thinks this is a typical situation working with asbestos materials. This is a typical work situation at Plant Asbestos and the majority of work for Armstrong was similar to this situation.

THORSTEN - 5

About a year ago he got short of breath and coughed, and he went to see Dr. Crenshaw. He noticed the shortness of breath even climbing a six foot ladder and climbing on staging. After three flights of stairs in this building, he would become short of breath. His chest ached and he coughed a lot. He first noticed the coughing before shortness of breath. The first time he stopped work was the end of February, then he was off approximately two months for surgery. He admits that the approximate date was February 27, 1955, to April 20, 1955. He returned to work to Plant Abestos and stopped working for then about six weeks ago. Then went to work for Thorpe. After he was off a week with the flu, he was employed by Thorpe.

He first knew he had asbestosis after the surgery. He thought he had it before but not before he went to see Dr. Crenshaw. The treatment after surgery helped.

Blue Cross paid \$200.00 on the surgery only. The balance of the bill is unpaid. Additional charges will leave a balance of \$400.00 for treatment. He paid the balance of the hospital bill, \$100.00, and the Blue Cross paid \$400.00. He paid \$1.00 and \$5.00 for two prescriptions. He was discharged by the doctor in October 1955 from treatment and is to return only if he does not feel right. He received \$307.71 unemployment disability.

He is all right now except he feels tired all the time. He is improved by rest. He can not put out as much as he did before. There is more effort to do a full day's work. He still has pains in his chest off and on. These occur three or four times a day, and sometimes they will be there for an hour steady. They are not too severe. Before surgery he smoked 30 cigarettes a day. After surgery he stopped smoking but the last two months after returning to work he smoked about four or five a day.

He did work at Hagai Falls, for Armstrong Cork, three or four days where insulation was against cold, and he used magnesium pipe covering. On one job he used wool felt. This job lasted only for a day. He did not work with air cell for Armstrong, he while working for Armstrong he used urethane and asphalt. Urethane and asphalt was the difference at Armstrong. On July 26, 1956, he started on the band saw at the I.D. A power house job at Antioch. He worked there 10 or 15 months. He mostly used urethane/epoxy. That time he did almost everything in the insulation line.

There were a couple of boat jobs at Neare Shipyards in Oakland. Also worked at Hastings Law School; also at the Santa Clara Hospital job.

The family doctor is Dr. Paul of Daly City. All he has had from him is a routine check. He did not advise the employer and he was going to the hospital for asbestosis.

From 1952 to 1955 he worked mostly for Plant Abestos. Most of the installation for Plant Abestos was indoors; new construction mostly. About 50% of the time he used magnesium pipe covering. Also some fiberglass and very little foam glass. There is about 10 or 15% asbestos filler in magnesium pipe covering. Urethane is about 10% asbestos.

THORNTON - C

DISCUSSION AND DECISION:

The great preponderance of the medical evidence indicates that applicant does not and did not have asbestosis, therefore, a denial award will issue.

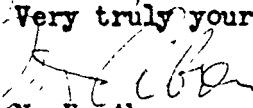

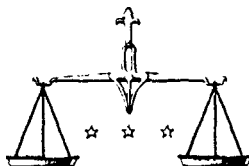
