Dear Mr. Yates:

Re: Senate 5.

Our three manufacturers are necessarily much interested in this bill by Senator Copeland to revise the federal food and drugs act. I have collaborated with the Senator in the preparation of this bill, from the time of its original introduction as the "Tagwell Bill".

This bill has passed the Senate and is now before a subcommittee of the House Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce, which held extensive hearings upon it during the past summer. Recently I conferred with Congressman Chapman, chairman of the subcommittee, at his home in Lexington, Kentucky. Last Thursday I again conferred with him in Washington. I also conferred with the four remaining members of the subcommittee, Congressmen Kenney, Cole, Reese and Wolfenden. I further conferred with Senator Copeland and Mr. Campbell.

The subcommittee will not take this bill up until February. The three democratic members are disposed to report it favorably for enactment at this session, but in an amended form. This enactment is now questionable, however. Confidentially speaking Mr. Chapman has asked me to revise this bill for him.
