

## Line Route For Chiang

TAIPEI (AP) — Crowds deep lined the 15-mile route as the body of President Chiang Kai-shek was carried to the Sun Yat-sen Memorial at noon today and placed in state there.

Some of the onlookers knelt in prayer. Thousands burned incense sticks and candles on improvised Buddhist altars for the 87-year-old Generalissimo, a Christian convert.

Preceded by a military band and honor guard, the glistening black coffin rode on a military truck from the Veterans Hospital, where Chiang died Saturday night. Hundreds of nurses held burning incense sticks as the coffin left the hospital.

Atop it was a white floral cross placed there by Mme Chiang. The truck was covered with flowers and also carried a picture of the Generalissimo.

The 74-year-old widow, clad in black and wearing dark glasses, rode in a black limousine behind the coffin, accompanied by Chiang's two sons by his first wife: Premier Chiang Ching-kuo, 65, and Gen. Chiang Wei-kuo, 58.

A Christian service will precede the burial. But the state funeral will be postponed indefinitely in the hope that someday it can be held on the mainland, which Chiang lost in 1949 to the Communists.

## Goodrich Employees Get Liver Tests

B.F. GOODRICH employees who have over ten years of exposure to vinyl chloride and those workers whose routine blood tests show abnormalities are getting liver scan tests at Lorain Community Hospital.

Goodrich Industrial Relations chief Ron Cross said the company was sending employees to the hospital after working hours.

Cross said the tests are part of Goodrich's health plan which is in compliance with the new federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration guidelines that went into effect April 1.

Vinyl chloride has been linked with angiosarcoma, a form of liver cancer. An Avon Lake employee, Charles Arthur of Elyria, was discovered to have the cancer several weeks ago, the first known case at the Avon Lake plant.

## Kipton Considers Controlling Rentals

KIPTON — Kipton Village Council Monday considered the adoption of a basic building code that can be used in dealing with situations in the village concerning the condition of buildings. They will also investigate the advisability of including an occupancy permit in such a code.

Councilman Gene Matthews said the move is needed to control rentals of apartments and buildings that are unfit for human habitation. Properties would be inspected before changing occupants to be sure they met basic standards.

Councilmen planned to examine building codes of Lorain and Oberlin.

The council is in the process of updating their code of ordinances which were adopted in 1955. They are also working on new traffic codes which will include some control of parking.

The finance committee reported it is considering the recommendation of a \$400 per year raise for the mayor. That salary is now \$200 per year.

Two letters from Columbia Gas of Ohio informed council the price of natural gas to the village will go up 4 cents per 1,000 cubic feet in bills rendered April 2 and another 8.07 cents per 1,000 cubic feet in bills rendered May 1.

Other business the council:

INSTRUCTED the clerk to write Pennsylvania Railroad asking them to fix the two crossings in the village and to the Camden Township Fire Department asking them to remove an old carnival swing from the village park.

AGREED to apply to the Ohio Department of Transportation to

participate in a 100 percent federally funded pavement marking project. The project is designed to determine if the frequency and severity of accidents can be reduced with proper road marking. The village would have to provide accident reports for evaluation of the project.

OKAYED the purchase of incident report forms for use by the police department.

## Stolen Kiss Is Downfall For Thief

DENVER (UPI) — A robber pulled a gun, made the teen-age clerk at the doughnut shop give him \$25, and then abducted her.

Not far from the doughnut shop the outlaw put his gun in his pocket and tried to kiss his captive, 17-year-old Vicki Van Male.

She reached into the man's pocket, slipped out the gun, and fired, shooting the robber in the chest. She escaped unharmed, and he was hospitalized in fair condition.

"I'd never shot a pistol before. I didn't know it would make such a big noise. The gun was almost as big as I am," said Miss Male who stands 5-4 and weighs 117 pounds.

"I heard someplace that you should keep an attacker talking," she said. "So I kept him talking, but I can't remember what we talked about."

Vicki said she was not afraid, but she was worried the incident Friday night might cause her to miss her drill team's competition the next day.

"I kept thinking, 'How dumb that this had to happen the night before the competition.'"

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
