MEMO TO REPORTERS:

For Your Information:

The results of all of Dr. Kehoe's studies, summarized, are:

1. The lead compounds discharged from the exhausts of automobiles have not created a hazard to the health of the public.
2. The concentrations of lead (from all sources) found generally in the air of American cities are low.
3. The amounts of lead to which the general population are exposed - from all sources, including foods and beverages - are below hazardous limits.
4. During the past twenty-odd years, there has been little change, on the part of the "average," adult American, either in his intake and output of lead, or in the amounts of lead retained in his body. Such slight change as has been observed has moved in the direction of a decrease in both intake and output, but it is not certain that this apparent trend is real in the sense of being a representation of a general situation.
