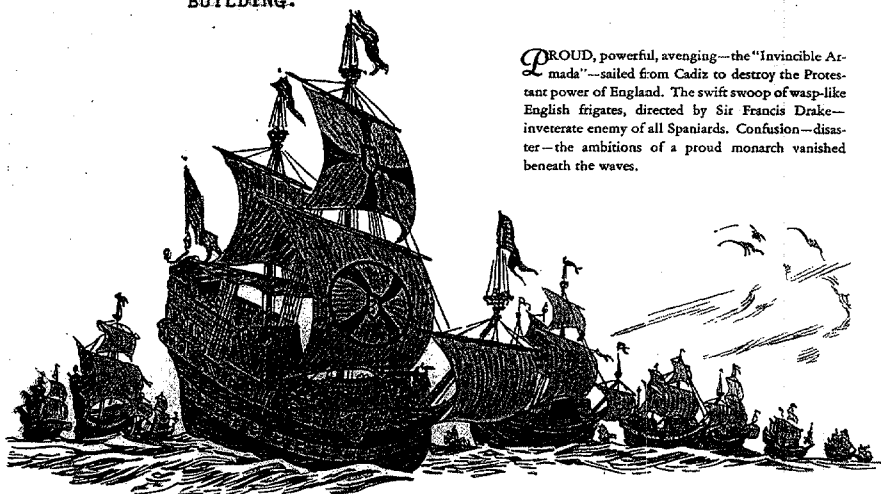

Dutch Boy red-lead comes not only in paste form for mixing with pure linseed oil, but also as a liquid ready for use. Both forms come in the natural orange-red color. The liquid also comes in black, browns, and greens. The paste can be shaded to any desired dark color.

When a white or light-colored finish is desired, as on the superstructure, the practice is to use Dutch Boy white-lead. In the case of metal, the white-lead is applied over a red-lead undercoating. White-lead paint is also noted for its protective qualities and durability. It produces an extremely washable finish—one that stands up under the frequent cleaning of painted surfaces aboard ship.
