Dear Doctor Pritzker:

The enclosed tabulation comprises our results of analysis of the tissues of [REDACTED], with which you so kindly furnished us. The figures for practically all of the tissues except the bone are well above the normal limits, and more specifically we find a lower concentration of lead in bone in relation to the high concentration in the liver, kidney, brain, spleen, etc. This is the type of distribution which one finds in cases where the exposure has been severe and has been rapidly absorbent and which occurs a short time prior to death, and confirms our observation and impression that Kriynovich died of acute tetraethyl lead intoxication.

I believe that we will have to discount the analytical figure for the small bowel as there was almost certainly some contamination to account for the high figure.

May I take this opportunity to thank you again for the courtesy shown me while in Cleveland and for your trouble in furnishing us with a copy of your observations and a set of sections. I have not yet had time to study the tissues but when they are gone over I will send you a copy of my observations.
