Dear Doctor Kehoe:

It has come to our attention that you have devoted considerable time to exploring the characteristics incident and effects of lead poisoning on persons who have been exposed to it.

We have a case involving an ailing working-man who contacted lead poisoning while working as an employee in a battery manufacturing plant. The employer, as well as its insurance carrier, are very dubious as to, first, that the environment in which the subject working-man was working could have caused lead poisoning and, second, that no residual or harmful after-effects could have resulted even if he did contract lead poisoning.

We would greatly appreciate it if you would furnish us with any literature of which you are the author, or with which you are familiar, pointing out the symptoms of lead poisoning and showing how it might permanently affect one who has suffered from it. Your attention to this request will be greatly appreciated.
