Dear Mr. Cojohn:

For your information, we are sending you a copy of the letters dated October 25 and October 21, 1968, we received from our Consulting Occupational Disease Medical Specialist, Dr. Thomas F. Mancuso, of the University of Pittsburgh.

We are also sending you a copy of the extensive article in the New Yorker Magazine of October 12, 1968, along with a copy of an article that appeared in the Wall Street Journal of November 7, 1968.

All of this applies to the conditions of Philip Carey Corporation in Cincinnati, of which they are well aware, since we have completely documented and instructed them on this hazard, and they, for one year, had a survey made by Dr. Mancuso and have his reports.

Philip Carey Corporation has, of course, followed all of the recommendations of Dr. Mancuso and has done an outstanding job in ventilation and in ridding the atmosphere of asbestos fibers. It is well aware of the problem and has done everything that is reasonably possible at this time to reduce the hazard.

The company has an asbestosis claim filed against it and allowed by the Industrial Commission about once every two or three years. However, it has many old employees who have worked for the company for many, many years, and this presents a situation of future liability which is rather serious and should be taken into account in the future of this company.

I will be glad to discuss it with you further during my next visit to New York, or if you are ever in Columbus, we hope you will come to visit our offices in our new building and allow us to welcome you.
