What colors are these hospitals using? Yellows, greens and reds form the basis for most of the color treatments. Of these the yellows—and the buffs, tans and browns obtained from yellow—are recommended and used most frequently. And the tans are particularly suited to hospital quarters because they are better able to

out impairing the very pleasing decorative effect.

The important point of all is to obtain the most suitable treatment for each room or group of rooms.
