several weeks ago.

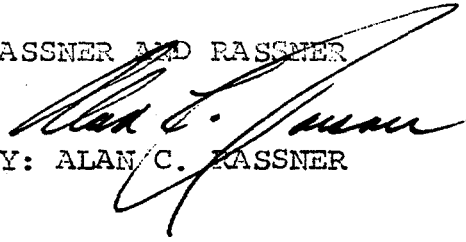
[REDACTED] continues to suffer from the effects of
