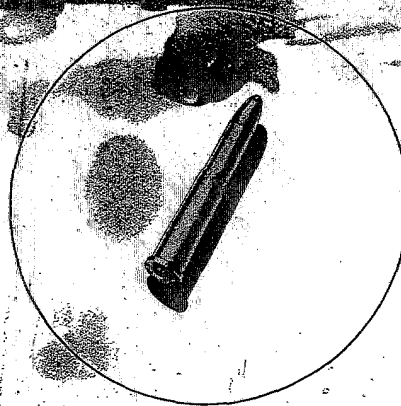




THE "WOTKYNS" CARTRIDGE

In the American Rifleman for January, Colonel Townsend Whelen describes some of the modifications in .22 L. R. rifles recommended to make what he calls "the Wotkyns" cartridge—a modified .22 Winchester Center Fire. He so names the cartridge after Capt. "Grove" L. Wotkyns, who has done considerable of the experimenting with high power loadings in the .22 W. C. F. cartridge.

Those who have rifles rechambered for this modified cartridge will be interested to know that it can now be had under the U. S. trade mark. It is

branded U. S. .22 W. C. F. Improved. That's what to ask for.

The U. S. .22 W. C. F. Improved carries a 45-gr. S. P. bullet (gilding metal jacket), is loaded with smokeless powder and has the Self-Cleaning (non-corrosive) primer. It develops a muzzle velocity of 2,350 feet per second, with a striking energy of 550 ft. lbs., and is remarkably accurate. With it have been made groups better than 2 inches at 100 yards and better than 4 inches at 200 yards—truly an exceptional small-game cartridge in every respect.
