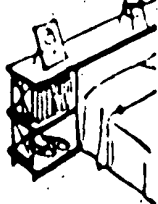


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jail and juvenile hall facilities.

Each agreed that the projects are imperative to county growth and that bond financing is the cheapest means. Each urged voters to get out and vote Tuesday — and to vote "yes."

Board Chairman Walter S. Gaspar of Palo Alto, fresh from a vacation in Wisconsin, termed Tuesday's prospects "encouraging."

"In the beginning, I felt there was a certain amount of apathy," he said. "Since my return, I've heard nothing but praise for the bonds, even phone calls from those who opposed my views on

the bond issue plan right in the start.

"I felt that a bond issue was the best way to handle it and get everything done now rather than wait another 20 years."

"I've fought for a new jail since I was sheriff in 1946."

"There's no doubt about the need in the hospital—it's very evident. We can't go on serving the people with the antiquated facility we have."

"Juvenile hall does not meet needs at the present and therefore must be expanded in order to carry out the proper program of rehabilitation."

Said other supervisors:

Arthur W. Brown, Gilroy: "The new jail, additions to the county hospital and the new juvenile hall are not only necessary; they are a must. We got to have them now one way or another."

"I think the bond issue is the best way to finance these projects because it permits us to spread the cost over 25 years and over an ever-increasing assessed valuation."

"If we were to build what we need now pay-as-you-go, we have to raise the tax rate 10 cents or more to get anything done soon. The bonds will raise the rate only 5 cents per \$1 assessed valuation."

Joseph M. McKinnon, San Clara—"All three projects are necessary, and bonds are probably the best way to finance them. Originally I favored pay-

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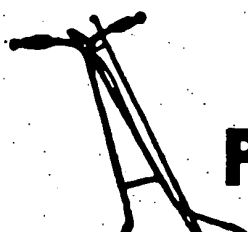
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
