ASSOCIATES HONOR GLIDDEN OFFICIALS

President Joyce and Horsburgh Mark 25th Year

The president and executive vice president of the Glidden Co. were honored for 25 years of service to the company at a meeting last night at the Union Club. About 80 Glidden officials attended.

Adrian D. Joyce, president and chairman of the board, and R. H. Horsburgh, executive vice president, both of whom were company founders, were presented watches by R. W. Levenhagen, vice president in charge of stores and purchases.

Harold T. Clark, former director and legal counsel for many years, spoke of the growth of the company under the direction of Joyce and Horsburgh.

The master was Dwight P. Joyce, vice president in charge of sales. Both President Joyce and Horsburgh discussed the growth of the company, the second largest manufacturer of paints and varnish in America.

At the speakers' table, in addition to the Joyces, Horsburgh and Levenhagen, were: G. G. Mowat, vice president in charge of Canadian business; Otto Miller, formerly associated with the financial division; J. A. Peters, treasurer; C. M. Kolb, secretary; Howard Beatty of the sales division; W. J. O'Brien, vice president in charge of manufacturing; P. E. Sprague, in charge of pigments, and P. B. Fehl, vice president in charge of the Reading (Pa.) division.

Congratulatory telegrams were received from all parts of the United States, Canada and Hawaii. Officials toasted 762 members of the company who are in the armed services.

Joyce and Horsburgh founded the company in Cleveland in 1917. It has grown so that it now employs 5,523 persons. Branch factories are in all parts of the nation.
