being outstanding industry employees; and honorary memberships went to Jim Archibald and Bus Inglehart. The convention defeated a move to expand the awards program by giving recognition to legislators of the United States and Canada who have demonstrated interest in aiding sub-contractors.

Delegates looked with more favor on a proposal to legalize use of stilts, and went on record as requesting labor unions who have outlawed the devices to abandon their objections. The convention also placed its stamp of approval on establishment of a liaison committee with the National Acoustical Contractors Association and continuing study with the GDCI (drywall contractors).
