BATTLE OF JUTLAND

Pound saw its value demonstrated during Crisis No. 1, the World War: For the first two years Britain followed a policy of "passive" resistance to German attacks. Then, in 1915, all that changed. The British attacked the Germans off Jutland and sent them home for good. Pound took part in that famous battle as captain of H.M.S. Colossus. Facing destruction by German guns, he staggered his ship's speed so that the shells missed—by inches.

The King of England rarely appoints an Admiral of the fleet in peacetime. But last July, when Crisis No. 3—the new World War—was shaping up, Pound was so promoted by King George VI.

Weather-beaten and sharp-eyed, Pound looks like what he is, a man of action. But his 45 years of service include not a little desk work. As second sea Lord, assistant chief of the naval staff and director of the plans division of the Admiralty, he gained administrative experience. As the Admiralty's representative to the League of Nations, he gained political experience.
