Men of wealth interested in aviation, including the Fords, have given the support which induces organization of a night air express service, within two months between New York and Chicago, according to E. M. Kevs, President of the Curtiss Aeroplane Motor Company, who spoke yesterday at the Exposition of Inventions at the Engineering Societies Building.

Public Health Service Calls Conference on Leaded Gasoline

WASHINGTON, April 30.—A conference of scientific men, officials of the Bureau of Mines and public health physicians to discuss the effects of gasoline containing tetraethyl lead has been called by Dr. Hugh S. Cumming of the Public Health Service.

The date of the conference has not yet been decided. The inquiry results from a report that a number of deaths have come from this sort of gasoline. The conference will decide if it is necessary to restrict the use of the leaded product.

DIAMOND BROTHERS AND JOHN FARINA ARE PUT TO DEATH

One Slayer and Two Accomplices in Brooklyn Bank Murder Die at Sing Sing.

LAST APPEALS FAILED

Both Governor Smith and the
Courts Refused to Stay
the Execution.

3 JURORS SEE THEM DIE

All Talk in Death Chamber—
Farina Shows Bravado After Suicide
Plan Is Thwarted.

OSWING, N. Y., April 30.—Morris Diamond, his brother Joseph and John Farina, condemned for the murder of the West End bank messengers in Brooklyn on Nov. 14, 1923, were executed in the electric chair in Sing Sing prison just after 11 o'clock tonight.

Not since the time that Charles Becker, former New York City police lieutenant, was put to death for the murder of the gambler Herman Rosen that has any execution aroused as much public interest.
