Victim Of Naval Air Bomb "Attack" May Get Damages

WASHINGTON, March 3 (AP)—Frank M. Grover of San Francisco, who was surprised and injured when a projectile fell like a meteor out of the air and started a deluge of sand and water on him and his companion, Miss Janet Hogg, as they were driving near Coronado in March, 1929, may get \$300 from the navy department to cover the cost of medical treatment for Grover and the damages to his car. The projectile was a naval air bomb.
