Dear Dr. Sayers:

I enclose a memorandum on X-ray technique at Saranac and Mt. McGregor. I shall send you later a memorandum of my conference with Dr. Gardiner and Dr. King.

The Saranac people urge that we send Dr. Meriwether up there. When it comes to getting results, Sampson has got it all over anything I have seen so far. Not only that, but he has very considerable experience in reading silicosis plates, and I think it will be well worth while if Meriwether could stay there a week or possibly two and also visit Mt. McGregor. Dr. King, the research man at Mt. McGregor, and Dr. Gardiner are highly interested in silicosis problems and in their relationship to tuberculosis and I think Meriwether would find a visit to Saranac and Mt. McGregor very valuable.

He should not go to Trudeau between May 16 and June 25 as during that time they are running their tuberculosis school. Possibly next year it might prove advisable to send Meriwether to this school. It is too late for him to go this year as the available number has been completed. I enclose a copy of their course.

At both Mt. McGregor and Saranac they are using film driers and I think this is going to be an essential part of Meriwether's equipment when he is handling large numbers of films.
