

Campaign Here, There

WASHINGTON (UPI) — With the election only a month away, both President Johnson and Sen. Barry M. Goldwater prepared today for speaking tours that will take them to the West Coast by the end of the week.

Neither contender for the presidency had any political activity scheduled today. GOP vice presidential nominee William E. Miller also was resting up in Washington but his Democratic rival, Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, was campaigning in California. (See page 10.)

Tomorrow Johnson plans to go to nearby Alexandria, Va., to see his wife off on a four-day whistlestop tour of the South. He also will join her tomorrow night at a Democratic rally in Raleigh, N.C.

Goldwater is making a quick trip tomorrow to Montgomery and Bucks counties in Pennsylvania near Philadelphia, before flying back to Washington to address the UPI editors and publishers conference in the afternoon.

Miller returns to the campaign trail tomorrow, headed for Wilmington, Hickory and Asheville, N.C., on the first leg of a new foray into the South and Midwest.

Details on the President's trips were not available, but it was known that he planned to speak Wednesday in Illinois and Iowa, Thursday in Cleveland, Ohio, and Friday in Louisville, Ky., "somewhere" in Tennessee and New Orleans.

After spending Saturday at his ranch near Johnson City, Texas, the President is scheduled to fly to San Francisco for a Columbus Day parade Sunday. Next Monday he will campaign "somewhere in California" and visit Butte, Mont., and Reno, Nev.

Goldwater's schedule calls for appearances Wednesday in Atlantic City and Newark, N. J., and Thursday in Lubbock and El Paso, Texas, and his hometown of Phoenix, Ariz.

Ike Hits A-talk

NEW YORK (UPI) — Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower said today he does not believe the use of nuclear weapons by the United States should be an issue in the presidential campaign.

"I don't think these are things we should be telling a potential enemy," he told a news conference. "Do you think the U. S. benefits by having the president telling everything he might do in a situation?" Eisenhower asked.

Asked directly if he thought nuclear weapons should be an issue in the campaign, Eisenhower replied:

"No, I don't. But it looks like it is. I don't think it's in the best interest of the country to take the details of how we will defend the United States and make them public."

The news conference was called to make public a report entitled "The Defense Role of Nuclear Weapons" by a special task force established by Republican presidential candidate Sen. Barry Goldwater.

Eisenhower endorsed and praised the work done by the group at "getting the facts," but would not endorse any of the conclusions drawn by it.

Eisenhower was asked if he felt that Goldwater was being responsible in his discussion of nuclear weapons.

"He was certainly responsible talking to me down at Gettysburg, but I don't know all the things he's said," Eisenhower answered.

After describing Goldwater as a "sincere and devoted American," the former chief executive added:

"I haven't followed all his statements, so I can't really say he's irresponsible."

Eisenhower, in his remarks, refused to divulge what arrangements he had made when president with battlefield commanders for use of the weapons under any circumstances. He said he felt this was a matter of national security.

Texas Report On JFK Same As Warren's

AUSTIN, Texas (UPI) — The attorney general of Texas issued a special report today on the assassination of President Kennedy. His report completely agreed with the Warren Commission's finding that Lee Harvey Oswald alone killed Kennedy last Nov. 22.

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr also said in his report that Oswald—not involved in any conspiracy — also shot and killed Dallas policeman J. D. Tippit and gravely wounded Texas Gov. John Connally.

Carr's comparatively brief report covered the state's investigation of the case. The day Kennedy was buried last November, Carr announced his intention of convening a court of inquiry into the assassination in Texas. But at Chief Justice Earl Warren's insistence he called it off.

Released eight days after the bulky Warren Commission report, Carr's report revealed nothing new.

Dickens Kin Dies

LONDON (AP) — Philip Charles Dickens, 76, a grandson of the Victorian novelist, died Sunday.
