Town To Dedicate New Plaza Saturday

LOS GATOS—Los Gatos' new Town Plaza at San Cruz avenue and W. Main street will be dedicated Saturday at 2:00 p.m. to a program highlighted by an address by Joseph F. Williamson, garden editor of Sunset Magazine.

The Plaza is located on the site of the old Southern Pacific Railroad depot which served Los Gatos from 1870 until the line was abandoned in 1893.

It first was conceived as a part of the Town Center Plan prepared by George S. Gatter & Associates in 1960.

The project was financed primarily from bond funds authorized by the voters in May of 1962. Its design utilizes simple materials to create a garden of fact in the center of the business community.

The plan provides a variety of spaces which are created by groves of redwoods in lawn areas, walkways and fountains. Ground cover of gazanias and succulents provide flower and foliage contrast. The entire space is set in a framework of flowering cherry trees planted in raised flower beds.

The landscape architectural firm of Royston, Hamamoto, Mayes & Beck designed the Plaza for \$25,000. Cost of the land was \$100,000, and street improvements cost another \$17,000. The dedication program includes a welcome by Mayor John Lincoln, invocation by the Rev. Richard T. Howley of St.

Public hearing of protests relating to the improvements will be held at 8 p.m. May 19 in Council Chambers. The project is for road work.



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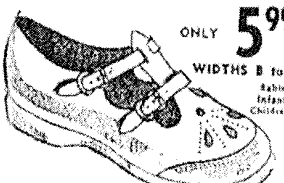
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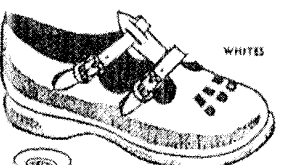
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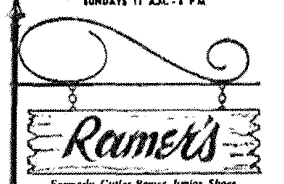
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
