TRAFFIC COMMITTEE REPORT

J. M. Barnhart read the Committee report as follows:

During the past year the Traffic Committee held three meetings to consider important subjects affecting transportation.

The National Classification Board, representing the motor common carriers, has docketed several proposals that would result in substantial increases in freight cost if they are adopted.

The original proposal NCB Docket 122 Subject 75 in January was superseded by Docket 123 Subject 164 in March, 1966. These proposals would establish density ratings on insulating materials based on packaged weight per cubic foot.

The committee members compiled comprehensive product data relating to density and this was collated by Jack Barnhart for the entire industry. We attended a hearing before the Board in July and thoroughly reviewed the unworkable and impractical aspects of density ratings on these products. It was pointed out that there are many thousands of different sizes and weights involved, and neither the shippers or carriers would be able to administer and police such a system of truck ratings. The Board urged to recommend "failure of adoption". This subject is still pending and disposition will not be announced until a later date.

Another related proposal has just recently been docketed by the National Classification Board, which would affect all products with a packaged density less than six pounds per cubic foot. This is Subject 235 of Docket 125 which will be considered and decided after public hearings in November. Briefly, this proposes a new "Density Rule" in the National Motor Freight Classification subjecting light density products to the following class ratings:

Density per cu. ft. (lbs)

Class

Less than 1 lb.

Three times Class 500

1 lb. but less than 2 lbs.

500

2 lbs. but less than 3 lbs.

400

3 lbs. but less than 4 lbs.

300

4 lbs. but less than 5 lbs.

250

5 lbs. but less than 6 lbs.

200

This is more drastic than the proposals for density ratings on insulating materials, and we must strongly resist such a rule in the classification. Members of our association should again express their views to the Board and seek support from motor carriers with whom we do business. Other

shipper groups are also opposed to this rule and will appear at the November hearings in opposition to the proposal.

The railroads' Uniform Classification Committee has several proposals for changes in Rule 15 of the rail classification, the latest being subject 11 of UFC Docket 247. This would amend Section 1 of the rule and require that cars fully loaded be subject to a minimum charge based on 10,000 pounds at the Class 70 rate. Although the proposal was approved, the railroads are reviewing the proposal further with their executive committee.

During the past year railroad cars have been in short supply in many parts of the country and the L. C. C. has invoked several service orders requiring the return of empty cars to ownership lines.

Demurrage charges on railroad cars were increased effective May 1, 1966, to \$7.50 per day for the first four days after expiration of "free time" and to \$15.00 per day for each day thereafter. Saturday, Sundays and Holidays are no longer included in "free time" if they occur after the second chargeable day.

A railroad proposed charge to receivers of \$25.00 for failing to clean out cars after unloading has been aggressively opposed by shippers and is still under consideration.

Due to increased loadings anticipated by the railroads, boxcars will continue in short supply during the coming year.

Motor carriers are also experiencing a shortage of equipment due to heavy increases in truck loadings.

MARKETING RESEARCH COMMITTEE REPORT

J. M. Barnhart read the Committee Report as follows:

The major contribution of the Marketing Research Committee is in maintaining a statistical program for NDAA members. Trade statistics provide management with bench marks for measuring degree of change and performance. The availability of reliable trade statistics serves management in a number of vital areas:

MARKETING - Analysts use trade statistics to establish seasonal aspects, market size, geographic distribution, and share-of-market. Trade statistics are correlated with other data in developing industry and company sales forecasts.

OPERATIONS - The forecast and seasonals established with trade statistics are utilized in products scheduling, inventory management, and facilities planning. By interpreting trade statistics and projecting trends, member companies can alert their research and development groups to the possible need for product improvement and new product development.

FINANCE - Budgeting and financial planning utilize the forecast and seasonals established with trade statistics.

Supervision!
Since the primary value of trade statistics is to serve as bench marks, the statistical program must provide efficient flexibility to permit refinements as needed -- with assurance that the ability to index change is not lost. The NIMA statistical program was carefully conceived years ago and has been maintained in strict accordance with this precept. Occasional refinements have been introduced as dictated by need and practicality. The only disruptive element is unavoidable and results from change in company membership. The attached schedule presents a complete record of membership for your consideration in utilizing NIMA statistics. Also attached is a summary table of NIMA shipments as requested at the Spring Meeting in Chicago.

The marketing Research Committee has not met formally since February, but has been in contact by phone. The listing of products reported in each category, by company and trade name, as revised at the February meeting is still current. Some difficulty was experienced by members in reporting dust liner by state, but this has been resolved; and the recap is now on a current basis.
