Former GSMD Senior Scout, Marty Riddon, now a Senior at Wayne State University, majoring in special education, had a very exciting trip this summer. She reports below.

Sue Hill (Boston-Montachusett Council), myself and nineteen young adults from eight countries attended the first conference at Olive House in London, England. This world center usually serves us as a hostel.

We "did" London through daily sightseeing jaunts. Experiences ranged from walks through Hyde Park to exploring palaces and churches, to talks with local government officials, to a meeting with Lady Baden Powell, the World Chief Guide.

Our group included factory workers, students, nurses and teachers. We exchanged songs, folk dances and ideas. Conversations late at night turned again and again to student unrest, to what we knew of one another's country and Scouting and change.

I was impressed and heartened by these concerned Guiders working so hard at Scouting and their own lives. Our favorite French song (in translation) reflects their spirit:

*Why wait until tomorrow,
Why wait until tomorrow,
Listen to that song,
That song in the wind,
Why wait until tomorrow.*

It was a privilege to meet the girls at the conference. I wish to thank Girl Scouts, USA, for helping make it possible and the Council for helping me prepare for it.

WARNS OF ASBESTOS DUST

We have received a letter from Dr. Roy L. Gealer, Chemical Engineering Department, Scientific Research Staff, Ford Motor Company, about an item in "Moreabouts for Brownie Girl Scout Leaders." He refers to page 43 which contains a suggestion for making candlestick holders from asbestos dough and the recipe, page 64, for the asbestos modeling material.

Dr. Gealer points out that "there is extensive literature in medical and environment health journals which indicate a relationship between exposure to asbestos dust and serious lung disease." He suggests that reference to the use of asbestos modeling material be deleted from the book and that the membership be informed of the potential danger from contact with asbestos dust.
