Very happy to learn from Gary Zirkle that they will definitely go ahead and fill his offshore platform with Therminol 66. The system will require about 5500 gallons of Therminol 66, which probably will be supplied in skid tanks; however, he was going to check with their offshore supervisory personnel to determine the best method of fluid delivery. It is anticipated that the fluid will be required sometime around December 15 to 25 and, as such, Gary asked me to check back with him on about December 8 regarding more specific delivery information.

I checked with Mr. Deters regarding previous contacts that had been made with Paul Gann on the disposal of contaminated Therminol FR with glycol. According to Deters, they had partially cleaned up the contamination and had a very low acid number, so they planned to continue using the present fluid. He also had relatively large amounts of triethylene glycol, which had been contaminated with the Therminol FR; however, they plan to dispose of that in a deep well rather than send it back for disposal. He also mentioned that when they decided to go ahead with the conversion, which would be made to Humbletherm 500, they would also pump it down into a deep well. I suggested that this probably was not the correct way to dispose of PCB's; however, they felt this method would not permit PCB into the environment for long periods of time and, thus, the PCB would have degraded. Apparently the 5¢/pound for disposal and the freight charges forced them to make this decision.
