Dr. Kenneth M. Lynch, Professor of Pathology and Dean of the Medical College, has been invited to review the research which has been concentrated at the Saranac Laboratory of the Trudeau Foundation, Saranac Lake, New York, in dust diseases of the lungs, and to complete the work for a report to be published. The Foundation will finance the project.

Since 1930 Dr. Lynch has been carrying on research in this important class of industrial diseases and has during that time published six reports, some of which were in collaboration with Dr. W. Atmar Smith, Professor of Clinical Medicine. Some of this research was of pioneer nature in a previously largely unknown subject.

Dr. Lynch has also been invited to present a discussion of the subject before the International Society of Chest Physicians in Atlantic City in June.

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lively minor points were discussed with little argument. Bevin pointed out that the deputy foreign ministers were "half way" through the Austrian treaty draft which would continue the work. There was no objection, although Russians previously had indicated that the German treaty would come first.

The ministers instructed their aides to pick out the main points of disagreement in a 750-page report, and to bring the points before the conference as soon as possible.

The canny Soviet minister then made his surprise package. He said the foreign ministers of Britain, the United States and Russia had agreed in 1945 that allied forces would be withdrawn from China by the earliest possible moment. He said the three powers should discuss how these matters are being filled by the three concerned powers. He added that in his opinion the "little China" situation showed "little improvement."

Marshall, attending his first important conference as secretary of state, asked for time to think it over, and quickly pointed out that China were to be discussed, China would be represented. Molotov did not agree that China could be present. He said it was a question of "action taken" by the three in carrying out pledges, and that China was not at the 1945 conference.

Marshall said he would give his answer tomorrow. In an almost casual manner to Molotov, he presented his proposal. He recalled that in New York his predecessor, James F. Byrnes, had suggested limiting the size of occupation troops and that Molotov had replied he would consider the question at Moscow.

Dr. Lynch Invited To Review Work In Dust Diseases

Dr. Kenneth M. Lynch, professor of pathology and dean of the Medical College of the State of South Carolina, has been invited to review the research in dust diseases of the lungs now concentrated at the Trudeau Foundation laboratory, Saranac Lake, N. Y.

The project, to be financed by the foundation, is along the same lines as research that Dr. Lynch has carried on here since 1930. His work in this important class of industrial disease has been published in six reports, some of which were in collaboration with Dr. W. Armar Smith, professor of clinical medicine at the college. Some of the work was of pioneer nature in a previously largely unknown subject.

Dr. Lynch also has been invited to discuss the subject before the International Society of Chest Physicians, which meets in Atlantic City, N. J., in June.

Dr. Lynch first joined the college in 1913 and served there until 1921 when he went to Texas. He returned to the medical institution in 1926 and since that time has been professor of pathology. He was named vice dean in 1935 and dean in 1943.

Dr. Lynch served as a captain in the army medical corps in World War I. He has served as vice president of the American Medical Association and chairman of the section on pathology for that organization.
