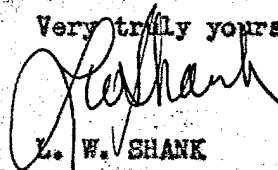

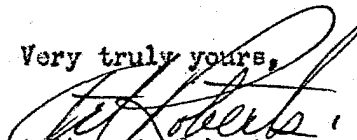
I have just received the information regarding the Medical Examination of Mr. [REDACTED] who is, as you will recall from our telephone conversation and my report of April 1st, an engine operator for the subject firm.

Mr. Reyenberg was taken to the Doctor in Houston in an ambulance as per his request. The examining Doctor was Herbert F. Poyner of Houston and his diagnosis was that the man had a mild case of intestinal Flu. A blood test was made and the blood was found to be O.K.

Both [REDACTED] and Mr. [REDACTED] seem to be perfectly satisfied with this diagnosis however, Mr Johnson of Abercrombie suggested that in his opinion it would be a good idea to have our Doctor check this man on his next regular trip. I told Mr Johnson that the decision on whether or not our Doctor would examine the man would have to come from our Medical Department.

I have not contacted Mr. [REDACTED] and will not do so unless advised by you. The above statement that Mr. [REDACTED] seemed to be perfectly satisfied, were Mr Johnson's words.
