The trial of the three counts, John Smith, David McClair and Will Hudson, on a charge of stealing a set of harness from Lewis's livery stable on East Third street, furnished amusement for the Police Court audience yesterday.

The two younger negroes, Smith and McClair, had evidently made up their minds to fasten the whole job on Hudson, who has been an employee at the stable for almost a year, and who actually had nothing to do with taking the harness, but did have a hand in finding the other two. They are wandering cops, who for several weeks have been permitted to sleep about the stable, with the address of an occasional "quaver" for the odd jobs they did and they stole the harness and sold it for \$5. On the stand Smith became badly scared when recounting a story he had told at a second-hand establishment.

"I told de man," said Smith, "that me feller had de harness, ap' s' de horse too big fur dem."

When the crowd laughed, he blushed his blunder, and laughed himself. There were many amusing situations, one of them being McClair's looking around under the seats in the dock, as though hunting a suit to cover his embarrassment.

Hudson was released and went back to his boss without loss of confidence, and the other two were given 120 days each.

Emmanuel, Shoots Min. — Smoker and Then Puts End to His Own Life.

(BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS.—N.Y.) NEW YORK, April 1.—Newton Schoonmaker, chief engineer of the Western Union building, New York, who lives on Pine street, Brooklyn, on returning home last night found his wife lying unconscious with a bullet hole in her breast, and beside her Percival Covert, a young man living on Euclid avenue, with a bullet wound in his head, and a revolver, of which two chambers had been discharged, lying beside him. The man and woman were taken to a hospital, where Covert died without recovering consciousness.

Mrs. Schoonmaker, who is 35 years of age, recovered sufficiently to say that Covert had shot her. She made no explanation of the cause of the tragedy.

On the dead man the police found letters, in which the police say Covert admitted he had embezzled several thousand dollars from the Williamsburg Trust Company.

WESTERN HALL OF FAME.

NEW YORK, April 1.—At the suggestion of Ernest Thompson Seton, the director of the U. S. Loda Fair have decided to establish a Western Hall of Fame in which there are to be statues of fifty of the men who distinguished themselves in the winning of the West. The selection of those to be honored, it is proposed, shall be determined by popular vote.

SUES THE JOBBERS' COMBINE.

NEW YORK, April 1.—Action which threatens to expose the interior workings of the candy combine has been brought in the Supreme Court against the board of directors of the New York Confectionery Jobbers' Association by David Seigler, wholesale confectioner, who says his business has been annihilated by reason of persecution and discrimination. Damages are asked in \$10,000 and the manufacturers' association, which, it is asserted, acts in union with the jobbers' association, is sued for a like sum.
