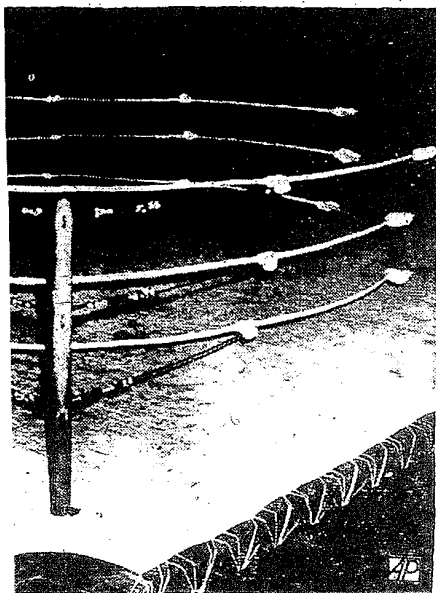

Those St. Louis Browns Are Just Unbeatable This Season

At the rate those unbeaten St. Louis Browns are going they're likely to finish second in the American league. Nobody's out in front of them or even close behind, but old man precedent says they can't win the pennant.

When the Brownies stopped Cleveland, 5-2, yesterday they tied the Yankees' 1933 league record for most consecutive games won at the start of a season, with seven. However, the New Yorkers of that happy April eleven years ago wound up seven games behind Washington in October.

Nine is the modern high mark in the National but the co-holders the New York Giants of 1918 and the Brooklyn Dodgers of 1940, were only second place also-rans to the Chicago Cubs and Cincinnati Reds respectively.

These figures probably weren't worrying Luke Sewell a bit after Steve Sundra's second victory. Though touched for ten hits, Sundra pitched shutout ball until after the Brown's four-run sixth inning uprising, marked by Don Gutteridge's triple and Vernon Stephens' two-run double.

Hank Borowy also joined the ranks of two-time winners as the Yankees squared the series with Philadelphia, 6-2. He now has won nine successive league games since last August 10 in addition to one world series and two exhibition triumphs. Hank allowed 11 hits, but Nick Etten thumped the A's into submission with a two-run homer, a double and single.

Early Wynn and Gil Torres took the bows in Washington's 2-1 edge over Boston. Wynn allowed only six hits, all singles, in hanging up win No. 2 and Torres, the Cuban third baseman, rapped out a double and single, driving in both runs scored off Yank Terry.

Bucky Walters knows now that Cincinnati can score but he might have been inclined to doubt it after pitching 21 innings over a two-game stretch during which the Reds did not cross home plate. Frank McCormick finally broke it up with a 13th inning home run giving Cincinnati and Walters a 1-0 nod over Rookie Alvin Jursich of the St. Louis Cardinals.

Mad as Boudreau

ATLANTA, April 27, (AP)—Jim Bagby, Jr., 17-game winner for the Cleveland Indians last season, declared today that his feud with Cleveland's manager, Lou Boudreau, "will never be settled."

"That business Boudreau and me burying the hatchet was the bunk," said the lanky pitcher as he swung aboard a northbound train and headed for maritime service boot training at Sheepshead Bay, N.Y.

Bagby's dispute with Boudreau flared last season after the Indians' manager benched him for "being out of condition." Bagby denied it.

Bagby said he hoped to return to baseball after the war—but not with Cleveland.

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
