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Russ author to give lecture Monday in SF

The American Russian Institute has scheduled a lecture by Konstantin Simonov, Russian author of the Book-of-the-Month Club best seller, "Days and Nights," for Monday night in the Scottish Rite auditorium, San Francisco. He will discuss culture in the USSR and common grounds from culture between the USA and the USSR.

Those attending are asked to take books to donate to the Books-for-Russia campaign.

A series of forum discussions on the general subject, "What's on Your Mind About Russia?" will be given at the California's Women's Club in San Francisco during May, June and July under the auspices of the American Society for Russian Relief Inc. and the American Russian Institute.
