The Citizens Committee of 1000, in charge of the campaign for the charter amendment, issued a statement, in which it was declared that "While the burden on taxpayers will be light, benefits may be beyond calculation if disaster strikes."

EXAMPLE OF INCREASE

"For example," the committee states, "a property owner with a house having a market value of \$4000 would pay only \$5.93 increased tax during the coming year or \$2.97 on each of the two instruments. Moreover, after initial capital investments are made during the first year of the tax, succeeding levies will be smaller than the 47-cent maximum if the war carries into other years. It must be remembered, also, that the wartime tax will stop when peace comes."

'Labor in the War' Meet Set at U.C.

BERKELEY, May 21.—Outstanding figures in the world of labor and government will be speakers June 6-7 when simultaneous conferences on "Labor in the War" will be held on the Berkeley and Los Angeles campuses of the University of California.

To bring Washington, D.C., officials and labor leaders to both meetings speakers will fly between Berkeley and Los Angeles. Among speakers will be:

Wendell Lund, newly appointed head of the labor production division of the WPB; Col. A. Robert Ginsburgh, personal representative of Undersecretary of War Patterson; James B. Carey, secretary-treasurer of the C.I.O.; Frank Fenton, National executive director of the A.F.L.; El Oliver, head of the labor relations branch, labor division, WPB; Paul Porter, chairman, Shipbuilding Stabilization Committee; John Edelman, OPA; Jonathan Daniels, OCD; Andrew Bismiller, and M. J. Lyden. The two-day conferences at Berkeley and Los Angeles will be held under the auspices of the labor division of the WPB; consumer division of the OPA, War Department, California State Federation of Labor, California State Council of the C.I.O., Railroad Brotherhoods, and the University of California.

President Robert Gordon Sproul of the University of California has appointed a faculty committee on arrangements for the conferences on the campuses at Berkeley and Los Angeles. Between 1500 and 2000 delegates are expected to be in attendance at each of the conferences.

Mrs. Pavon brought suit for separate maintenance today in Superior Court against Anthony Pavon, 48, declaring that he receives \$350 a month as a foreman painter at Moore Shipyards.
