Venture up a flight of stairs to the Levee Market, an area where an assortment of regional craft artists display their wares. Here, visitors may find a token of New Orleans to take home with them.

Enter the third level of Riverwalk to the Bon Fête to taste the flavors of New Orleans. This convenient food mart offers a variety of ethnic cuisine. Stop by the Café Du Monde for beignets (see sidebar) and chicory-flavored coffee, a New Orleans tradition. Its locations include the Riverwalk and French Quarter.

Cruise on the Mississippi

If an adventure on the Mississippi appeals, cruise down the Mississippi in the paddlewheel ship Creole Queen or the riverboat Cajun Queen. These luxury vessels are reminiscent of New Orleans steamboats that journeyed along the Mississippi during the glory days of the 1830s and 1840s. Daily tours to nearby plantations and the site of the Battle of New Orleans are available.
