Black and White Revue Expected to Put Kick in 'Y. W.' Carnival

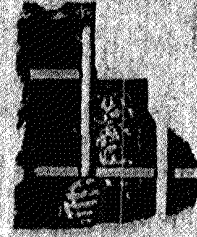
PIERRETTE or Jacqueline, ruf-
