much confusion existed among the judges and timers at the 200th mile yesterday and the announcement was made that Hartz had gone into first place. This announcement was later withdrawn, but when the official tabulation was started at the close of the race the possibility that Murphy might have been declared for a time was again brought forward.

Officials said they expected to complete the tabulation some time today. It was not expected it would make any changes in the standing of the winners, but it might affect Murphy's record and also the distribution of lap prizes, which amount to \$50 for each lap.

Murphy was given a remarkable co-operation by his pit men. He made only three stops to change tires and replenish his fuel tanks. On his third stop gasoline was dumped into the tanks and a rear wheel was changed in 25 seconds. On a previous stop his mechanics dived in and gas and changed two front wheels in 28 seconds. Murphy knew just what his car was capable of doing and he pushed it to the limit, maintaining a record-breaking speed.

HARTZ' RECORD.

Hartz, who finished second, also is a former mechanician. He drove into second place shortly after the sixtieth mile and from then on to the finish he gave Murphy a desperate fight. His time was 5:20:24.50, an average of 23.54 miles per hour, which also was far in advance of the record.

Eddie Hearne, a veteran racer, offered a French car to third place in 5:22:28.60, for an average of 23.4 miles an hour, while Ralph De Palma, one of the favorites, was fourth in 5:31:04.65, an average of 20.61 miles an hour.

Ora Hulse was fifth in 5:31:13.45, an average of 20.56 miles an hour. Eighth place went to Ted Vail in 5:37:52.84, an average of 18.79 miles an hour. J. P. Fetterman finished seventh in 5:40:55.41, an average of 18.95 miles per hour.

Eighteenth place went to Tom Allen in 5:59:07.42, an average of 17.85 miles an hour. Tom Allen was ninth in 5:57:55.13, an average of 18.29. Joe Thomas finished tenth in 5:59:01.47 for an average of 18.19.

REWARDS FOR VICTORS.

As winner of the event Murphy will receive approximately \$35,000. Twenty thousand dollars was awarded first place and \$10,000 as lap prize money. In addition automobile accessory companies provided cash prizes which will bring Murphy's total to the \$122,000 mark. Hartz got \$10,000 for finishing second, Hearne, in third place, \$5,000; De Palma, in fourth place, \$2,500; Hulse, Edme, Wonderlich, \$2,500; Fetterman, \$1,000; Vail, \$1,500; Allen, \$1,500 and Thomas, \$1,000.

According to the speedway officials there were 125,000 paid admissions, the largest crowd that ever witnessed a race at the Indianapolis course. Although official figures were lacking the total receipts are expected to reach the \$200,000 mark. The general admission was \$1.00, which included \$275,000, and, besides this, there were extra charges for grandstand, automobile parking spaces and infield privileges.

Murphy was the only driver injured during the race, although two cars were in mishaps. It was all the fault of an inflated rubber cushion, which exploded while Murphy was tearing along over the brick road. After the race was over Murphy climbed out of his car and limped painfully to a seat.

"What's the matter, Jimmy?" he was asked.

He smiled and said: "I had one of those air cushions in the seat of my car. Well, it burst somewhere along the line and I rode the bare boards until the finish of the race. That was the longest part of the grind for me."
