Dear Phil:

I am not sure whether you were to write to me or I you in relation to a visit to the Shipyards. However, if something has come up in the mean time whereby there is no point in doing what you suggested, it will certainly not hurt anything for me to tell you when I can be in the east. If you do not need me, all you need to do is let me know, for although I shall be happy to be of any help, I shall be equally pleased to be released if it is unnecessary.

I ought to go to Wilmington, Delaware on either the third or fourth week in June. This would be a good time for me to visit Baltimore. Accordingly I suggest meeting you on either Thursday or Saturday of next week, that is, June 17 or 19, or on Wednesday or Saturday of the following week. I suggest either of these days of the week for the reason that I can see you either before or after visiting Wilmington. In any case I should have a day and a half or two days at Wilmington. If you want me to come, you need only wire as to a date and place to meet. Perhaps in view of the shortness in time, I might also refer to Wednesday or Saturday, June 30 and July 3. Any one of these weeks will be satisfactory.
