Gilbert J. Klecan, 17, of 4976 Santa Cruz Ave., winner of the 1946 soap box derby at Akron, O., yesterday was granted \$8638 damages for injuries he sustained a few minutes after his victory.

The award took the form of approval of a compromise by Superior Judge Joe L. Shell. The money was paid by the Chevrolet Division of General Motors Corp. The court's award provides that \$5000 shall be placed in war bonds, for delivery to the boy when he is 21. By winning the derby, which was sponsored by the motor car manufacturer, he also captured a \$2000 scholarship.

After his victory on Aug. 20, 1946, Klecan was being towed by one of the company's station wagons. It stopped and the derby-winning scooter rolled beneath it, injuring the boy's back. Local physicians who have been caring for him say that he appears to have fully recovered.
