Detroit Wings Face Rangers

DETROIT, April 10 (AP)—A courageous Detroit Red Wings team, victor over Toronto in a thrilling semifinal series, got set today for the opening Tuesday of its Stanley Cup hockey championship series with the New York Rangers.

Detroit's Leo Reise drove in a 10-foot goal at 8:39 of the first overtime period last night to give Detroit a 1-0 decision over the Leafs in a rugged game before 14,734 slightly hysterical fans here.

That victory gave Detroit the series 4-3 and ended Toronto's three-year reign as champion of the Stanley Cup playoffs.

The championship series will open on Detroit ice Tuesday, with play moving to Toronto on Thursday and Saturday. The move was made because Madison Square Garden—the Ranger's home—currently is the scene of a circus.

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THIRTEENTH IN A SERIES ON MAJOR LEAGUE BASEBALL . . .

Cubs To Bank on Young Infield

(This is the 13th in a series on the 1950 prospects of the major league baseball teams.)

NEW YORK, April 10 (UP)—Frankie Frisch's main objective this season is to get the Chicago Cubs out of the National League cellar and he is going to try to do it with the youngest infield in the majors.

That new inner-defense is the first step in Fordham Frankie's long-range complete overhauling plan which has as its aim a young, speedy, aggressive club which will not be shackled with a defeatist complex.

Frisch believes that defeatist complex is important. "After all the team has finished in the cellar two straight years," he pointed out. "So the fellows who have been with the Cubs all

that time have become pretty accustomed to losing. That's why I'm going with kids and with the old-timers who I know will be able to snap out of it."

That infield will have Preston Ward, 22, at first; Wayne Terwilliger, 23, at second; Roy Smalley, 23, at short; and Bill Serena, 25, at third. The only trouble is that with the exception of Smalley the rest still have to prove they are major leaguers.

Ward, who failed to stick in a try with the Dodgers, hit .303 at Fort Worth, Terwilliger .278 at Los Angeles and then .223 in 36 games with the Cubs, Smalley .245 and Serena .281 at Dallas and then .216 in 12 games with Chicago.

If those averages don't improve Frisch always can call on dependable veterans Phil Cavarette at first and Emil Verban for utility. The outfield also lacks power

although the three men who figure to play regularly all can hit that long ball. They are Hank Sauer, who hit 31 homers last year, Andy Pafko, who clubbed 18, and Hal Jeffcoat, who hit only two but before 1949 did a fair job of rattling the fences. Their overall batting averages, however, left a lot to be desired.

Pafko hit .281, Sauer .275 and Jeffcoat only .245. You don't win pennants with that kind of outfield power and Frisch knows it. So he may give rookies Bob Borkowski and Carmeh Mauro a shot at regular berths. Borkowski hit .376 at Nashville and Mauro .292 at Los Angeles.

Frisch has named Johnnie Schmitz, Bob Rush, Doyle Lade, Walt Dubiel and Paul Minner as his starting pitchers. The surprise in the lot was Minner, a southpaw who saw only limited action with the Dodgers last season, winning three and losing one.

Schmitz won 11 last year for one of his poorest seasons; Rush, who has one of the fastest balls in the league, 11; Lade four and Dubiel six.

Three veterans who have been around a long time, Emil (Dutch) Leonard, Johnny Vander Meer and Bill Voiselle, will be available for spot duty.

Back of them are Bob Chipman, who won seven last season; Dewey
