NEW WAR EXEMPTION FOR WAR VETERANS

SAN FRANCISCO, April 9.—Honorably discharged soldiers resident in California who have been separated from the service because of disabilities will be entitled to a personal property exemption of \$1000 the same as soldiers discharged at the end of the World War, according to a bill which has passed the California Senate in the form of a proposed constitutional amendment.
