

CATTLE STEALING

Juan Chutnacut is Jail to Await Superior Court Trial.

Was Caught With Another Indian in the Act of Slaughtering Stolen Cows - Chinese Violating Crawfish Law.

The Indian, Juan Chutnacut, had his preliminary hearing yesterday afternoon before Judge Thorp, resulting in his being bound over to the superior court on the charge of cattle stealing, his bail being fixed at \$750. He is now in jail, not having been able to furnish the bonds. Sam Taylor, manager of Warner's ranch, where the alleged stealing took place, John Kolb an employee of the ranch, and Frank Wright, a former resident of this city, who was visiting the ranch from San Francisco at the time of the offense, testified for the people and clearly proved that Chutnacut was one of the Indians who was connected with the running off and slaughtering of certain cattle. They had suspected that the Indians were engaged in this and one day laid in wait and saw four mounted Indians run off the cows and dispatch the beast, but only recognized two of them, the others escaping. The other fellow is now in jail awaiting his arraignment before one of the superior judges.

OLD MEN DISCHARGED.

On motion of Assistant City Attorney Watson Parrish, the two old men, Brown and Cloyd, were dismissed from custody. It seems that they were arrested on a complaint charging them with begging. The law, however, provides against begging by healthy men, but in this case neither of the men would be able to do a day's work, being feeble both in mind and body, and not criminals but simply unfortunate men.

VIOLATED GAME LAWS.

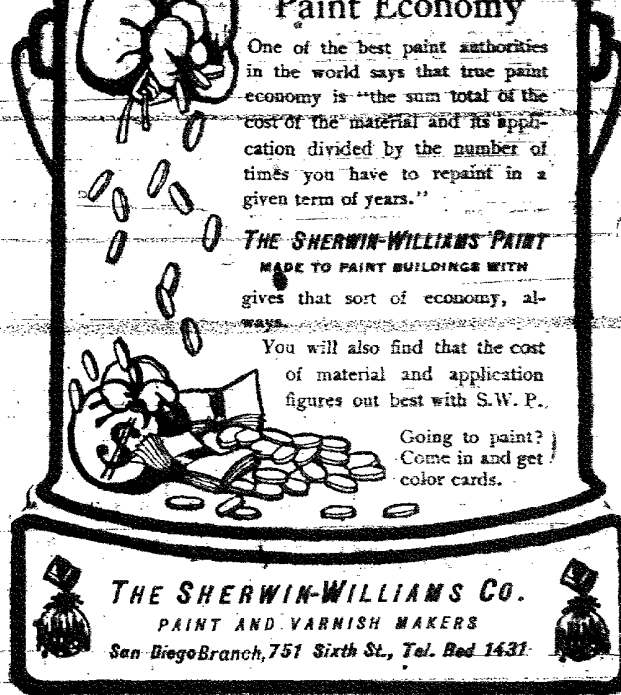
Game Warden Harry K. Weitzel arrested a Chinaman at La Playa by the name of Ah Su, yesterday morning, for having crawfish in his possession between the dates of April 1st and Aug. 15th, contrary to the provisions of the game and fish laws of the state. The Chinaman was caught just inside the point where he is in the habit of putting down his traps, but a companion fisherman also wanted by the officers, got away. Su was arraigned yesterday morning before Judge Thorp, and will have his hearing next week. Mr. Weitzel brought over two sacks of the crawfish taken from the Chinaman, which were later thrown back into the bay.

A LOTTERY CASE.

A Chinaman giving his name as Jim Sing, was arrested in Chinatown yesterday afternoon by Officer George Cooley for setting up a lottery. He was arraigned before Judge Thorp, and taking twenty-four hours to plead, deposited \$300 bail for his appearance Monday morning.

EQUALIZERS IN SESSION.

The members of the city board of equalization had a quiet day yesterday. In the morning session Theodore Pintzberg appeared with three petitions, each of which were denied. They were for reduction in the assessment on lot C, in block 3, of Horton's addition; for a reduction in the assessment of the west half of lots B and F, in block 23, of Horton's addition, and for a reduction in lots G and H in block 22 of the same addition. 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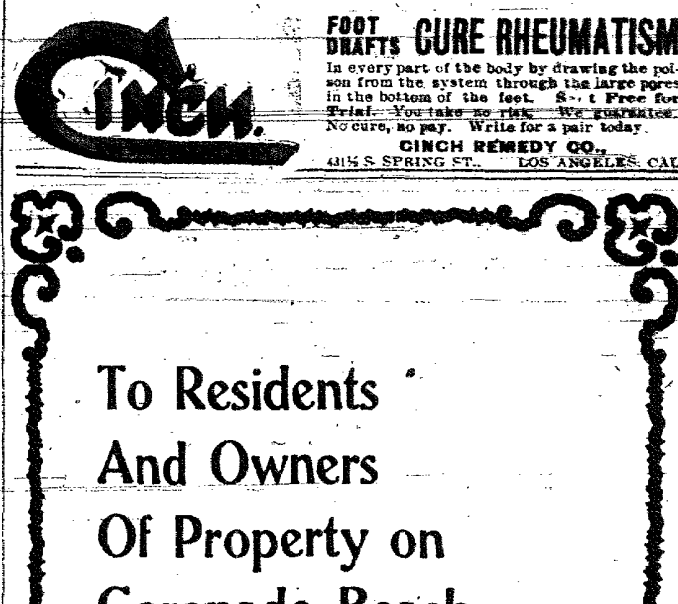
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
