marketed an instance in the marketing of last year's crop of California grapes where 3000 cars piled up at once in New York, being about double what the mar- ket could normally consume. He said that unless all factions would unite he did not see any hope for grape growers, shippers and marketers making a profit in the handling of next year's crop. He further pledged the support of the Department of Commerce in back- ing the growers if they would get together in an association for their common good.

He also cited one instance of a car load of grapes consigned to a market, a normal haul of 2100 miles. The car eventually traveled 3900 miles before it was dumped, the entire shipment a total loss.

THREEFOLD LOSS LIKELY

"I presume that not only the railroads lost on that, the shipper must have lost also and the grower too," he said. "We want the car to move from its primary shipping point to the point of consumption without any delay. If we can regulate that movement we will put the industry on its feet."

Hoover said that he did not believe it possible to get 100 per cent of the factions involved into an organization, but that he was hopeful that 70 or 80 per cent of them would unite for their common good in the handling of the grape crop.

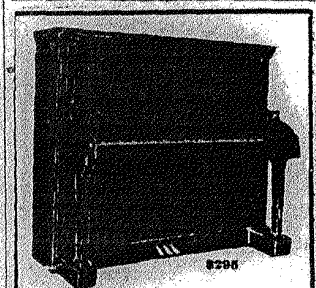

S. F. Having Warmest Year in Its History

San Francisco is experiencing the warmest year in its history, according to Forecaster T. R. Reed of the United States Weather Bureau. Up to September 1 the accumulated excess of temperature over normal was 707 degrees, or almost three degrees a day on an average. Although September has been somewhat cloudy, so far the month has been above the average in temperature. Statistics show that September is the warmest month of the year in San Francisco. In announcing the unprecedented warmth of the current year, the forecaster calls attention to prophecies made last winter by amateur meteorologists of both Europe and America, that 1926 would be a year without summer weather, full of storms.



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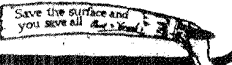
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
