There are also five general merchandise stores, two plumbing and machine shops, a large hardware store, an agricultural implement store, hotel, two boarding houses, meat market, bakery, vegetable and fruit store, drug store, news stand, harness shop, two shoe shops, two barber shops, two blacksmith shops, a cyclery, livery stable, planing mill and lumber yard, painter and paper hanger, contractor and builder, four real estate firms, three doctors, a dentist, an attorney, water works, gas plant, telephone system which extends to all the outlying orchards and farms, a nursery of State-wide reputation a fire company. We have no saloons.

A 250,000 gallon reservoir on Nob Hill, 200 feet above the town gives a pressure sufficient to throw two streams of water over the tallest buildings in town, thus insuring a fine fire protection.

Three rural routes distribute the mail to the outlying sections. Disceglia Brothers Cannery, the Morgan Hill Canning and Packing Company, and Griffin & Skelly packing house give employment to a large number of hands during the packing season. The Morgan Hill Weekly Times is now in its tenth year, and has a large circulation, covering its field quite thoroughly.

Within four miles of Morgan, over fine highways, may be found delightful camping and picnic grounds beside running streams in the foothills of the mountains. Farther on picture-que scenery, worthy of the finest artists, may be had. Four streams—Coyote, Puckwood, Liagas and Uvas creeks—lead the way to good fishing and hunting grounds.

There are many beautiful sites for summer resorts which would prove very desirable.
