Dear Mr. Mitchell:-

I was very glad indeed to receive your letter as I was just on the point of writing to you.

We expect to get under way with our asbestos studies about the 15th of May and will go first to Waukegan, then to New Orleans, and then to Charleston, arriving there about the 25th. We will give you definite notice ahead of time.

From the point of view of a complete, rounded-out, scientific study, I think it is desirable to examine all the employees where such a procedure is practicable. This tends to obviate any future comments and criticisms that certain types or processes were overlooked. I am inclined to agree with Mr. Simpson, therefore, that if any men are to be examined, it is preferable to have them all examined.

Will you give some thought as to who shall make the X-ray examinations? These should be done by a competent roentgenologist according to a technique which we will define. It is necessary to do this so that we may have, as far as possible, comparable results.
