Defendant, GARLOCK INC., responds to Plaintiff's Subpoena Duces Tecum (attached to Plaintiff's Fourth Amended Notice of the Deposition of the Corporate Representative of Garlock Inc), as follows:

GENERAL OBJECTIONS

1. Plaintiff's Subpoena Duces Tecum seeks information going back to the 1930's. Garlock has made a good faith effort to identify and produce documents germane and relevant to Plaintiff's subpoena. However, Garlock has found it difficult, if not impossible to retrieve all of the documents that are potentially responsive to the extremely broad requests tendered by the Plaintiffs. Garlock is producing numerous product catalogs and advertising brochures going back many years, but Garlock does not represent or guarantee that all catalogs or advertising brochures prepared or issued by Garlock over the past seventy years are being produced in response to Plaintiff's request. Garlock does represent that it is producing all relevant and responsive material that has been located in its corporate files after completion of a good faith search by Garlock employees and counsel. Garlock also represents that the catalogs and advertising brochures being produced do identify the gasket products

manufactured and sold by Garlock since the 1930's. Garlock generally objects to all requests in the subpoena on the grounds that the requests are overbroad, vague, ambiguous and unduly burdensome and not reasonably calculated to lead to the discovery of admissible evidence.

2. The subpoena seeks production of all documents relating to all gasket products manufactured/sold and distributed by Garlock from 1930 to the present. The requests are not limited to Garlock asbestos-containing gasket products identified by Plaintiffs in this litigation. Additionally the requests are not limited to the time frame or job sites at issue in this litigation. Therefore, the requests are overbroad, unduly burdensome and are not reasonably calculated to lead to the discovery of admissible evidence. Garlock objects to all individual requests for production set forth in the Subpoena Duces Tecum on the grounds that the requests seek information not relevant to this litigation.

3. The subpoena is duplicative of earlier requests made by Plaintiff's counsel to Garlock in the asbestos litigation. Garlock affirmatively asserts that it has responded to numerous requests for production propounded by Plaintiff's counsel in thousands of asbestos cases over the past two decades. In its search for documents and materials responsive to these requests, Garlock has determined that the majority of documents potentially responsive to these extremely broad requests have previously been produced to counsel representing the Plaintiffs. As evidence of these prior productions, and in support of Garlock's position that Plaintiff's counsel already possesses much of the material requested herein, Garlock attaches as Exhibit "A", a copy of the Exhibit List

filed by Plaintiff's counsel in these cases. Garlock objects to the Subpoena Duces Decum filed here because said requests are duplicative and cumulative in nature. A request that Garlock produce identical or substantially similar catalogs and advertising brochures in this litigation is unduly burdensome and oppressive.

4. Garlock objects to all requests in the Subpoena Duces Tecum to the extent said Subpoena requests the production of trade secret or proprietary material and said material will not be produced absent an appropriate protective order.

Garlock affirmatively asserts that the documents produced are samples of the information maintained in Garlock's microfiche database regarding product sales. Garlock maintains a microfiche database regarding sales going back to 1978. The database contains information regarding the identity of customers, dates of sales, the style number of products sold (by product code), the amount of product sold and the value of each sale. If requested, Mr. James Hefron will detail the nature and scope of the microfiche database at his September 10th deposition. Garlock's previously filed Responses to Plaintiff's Master Set of Interrogatories and Document Requests (attached as Exhibit B) stated that Garlock would search its microfiche database for post 1978 sales to customers, job sites and employers at issue in this litigation. (See Answer to Interrogatory 13), and Garlock reiterates its willingness to proceed with Plaintiff specific searches of the microfiche database. The hard copies of the sales

documents referenced in the microfiche database are currently stored at a warehouse in Palmyra, New York. Garlock does not presently have access to those documents because of litigation involving the building. However, a search of the microfiche database will provide the identical sales information contained in the documents stored at the warehouse.

*** MINUTES ***

1. President John A. Brown, Jr., called the meeting to order at 9:30 A.M. and asked each person present to stand and identify himself and his company affiliation.

2. The minutes of the last meeting were presented for reading. Mr. Peole moved that the reading be omitted, seconded by W.C. Atkinson and so voted.

3. The Financial Report was presented by Mr. E.A. Schuman, Treasurer. Mr. Steele moved that it be accepted, seconded by Mr. Hough, and it was so voted unanimously. The report is attached.

4. W. Jay Flocken, legal counsel, presented a report entitled 'Some Aspects of the Legal Problems on Asbestos Publicity: Grounds for Possible Libel Action and Standin; to Sue'. Mr. Flocken referred to a recent example of statements made on a radio broadcast and then discussed the general problems involved in bringing an action for libel where the product or manufactured article has been named but no particular manufacturer has been named. Council discussed briefly the New York Court of Appeals' rulings in Drug Research Corp. v. Curtis Pub. Co., 7 N.Y.2d 435, and Harwood Hearn. Co. v. Nat. Broadcasting Co., 9 N.Y.2d 460. In conclusion, it was stated that without either a specific and direct reference to a particular plaintiff or necessarily implying plaintiff's fraud or deceit in putting a dangerous product upon the market, the probability of success of a libel suit in the circumstances referred to would be difficult to assure.

5. Mr. A.C. Steele, Asbestos Corporation, Ltd., presented an interesting report, on behalf of the asbestos fibre producers, concerning supply and demand for raw asbestos fibre. He mentioned the current shipping strike, which if long continued, could have a most adverse effect on mine operations.

6. Dr. J.M. Wolfais, Corporate Medical Director, United States Rubber Company, was the Guest Speaker, and his subject was "Asbestos and Health".

Dr. Wolfais referred to the alarming information that has appeared in the lay press concerning the alleged deleterious effects of asbestos on the health of the public. Apropos of this, some of the highlights of the present state of knowledge on the effects of asbestos on health were reviewed. Dr. Wolfais read excerpts from certain news releases, and said that he could find many weaknesses in the statements made.

Dr. Wolfais described the development of a preventive medical program to protect the health of employees from possible adverse effects of exposure to asbestos, and gave a brief account of the development of the present preventive health program in the United States Rubber Company for its asbestos employees.

An extensive question and answer period followed Dr. Wolfais's talk, and our members were most appreciative of the privilege to hear him.

Sausch and Lomb Automatic Dust Counter

Due to Mr. Nelson's unavoidable absence the intended demonstration of the 40-2 portable dust counter was postponed.

There was some discussion on the merits of this counter and the consensus was that it would be of particular value in monitoring and quick checking operating areas after correlating with the Greenberg-Smith Impinger.

Environmental Health Survey

Dr. Lewis J. Cralley reported that the survey is progressing on schedule and that they are now in the areas of Friction Materials, Asbestos Cement Products and Insulation Materials.

Control of Dust by Treating Stock

Reports were given on the results obtained in control of dust by the application of oils and other solutions both to blended stock and to asbestos fiber.

Two companies are experimenting with S.J. 5 made by the Lumm Chemical Co. Preliminary controlled test runs indicate that it is possible to reduce the dust counts by applying up to 1% by spraying it on the fiber or on the stock. Further experimental runs will be made to determine the minimum effective amount to be used and its effect, if any, upon the products.

Another company has been using a mineral oil sprayed on the stock with satisfactory results.

General

There was some discussion and exchange of ideas on how to control dust at braiders and narrow fabric looms.

One company has installed vacuum ducts in the center of the braiders except where they make braid over braid. Here it is installed at the perimeter of the braider. Both systems have reduced the dust counts considerably.

Another company has succeeded in reducing the dust at weaving by running the warps over a smooth pick-up roll running in a trough containing a solution of 20% Velubra Softener GSE and 80% water. The softener is supplied by Amalgamated Chemical Corp., Rorer and Ontario Sts., Philadelphia, Pa.

The softener prevents the yarn from drying out by absorption of moisture from the air resulting in a smoother and less dusty yarn.

Proposal by the Industrial Hygiene Foundation of America, Inc.

Dr. Robert deTreville and Dr. Paul Gross of the Industrial Hygiene Foundation had been invited to attend a luncheon meeting for the purpose of presenting to the industry, through the A.T.I., a proposal for a supplementary investigation of the Specificity of Asbestos Bodies and the biologic effects of trace substances associated with Chrysotile Asbestos.

In addition to the speakers, 26 members and guests attended the luncheon meeting.

It was suggested that a contract could be arranged between the Industrial Health Foundation and a group of interested corporations who would contribute the funds for the investigation which would amount to a total of \$350,000; or it could be separated into two parts, the first of which would cost \$150,000 (Phases 1 and 2), and the second part would cost \$200,000. The second part would be optional at the completion of part one.

With the consent of Drs. deTreville and Gross, a copy of the presentation is attached to the minutes.

Brochlet on Method for Determining Asbestos Dust Concentration

Since February, 20 additional copies have been shipped, by request, to companies in the U.S.A., Canada, England, The Netherlands, Norway, Sweden and Australia.

In total, 213 copies have been shipped out. There are still approximately 800 on hand.

The Secretary has a record of all shipments.

MINUTES OF THE 1966 MEETING OF THE COMMITTEE
ASBESTOS TEXTILE INSTITUTE TESTING
JUNE 9 - 10, 1966

A full complement of all member companies was present at the Sales Promotion Meeting on June 9, 1966.

We reviewed all known foreign competition situations feeling that it is quite important to stay abreast with inroads that have been made in the U.S.A. even though to date they might be considered minor in sales volume. The latest report from the U.S. Department of Commerce, Washington, indicates the following imports into the U.S.A. which are sizable enough to be of some concern:

We have been unsuccessful in placing the A.T.I. display at the Franklin Institute Museum, Philadelphia. It was decided that the Sales Promotion Committee would issue a leaflet or make available photos to be sent to a sizable list of technical and engineering schools soliciting the use of the display on their campus.

We discussed the Asbestos Fibre stockpiling program reporting that Arizona so-called Textile Grade Asbestos Fibre purchased by the U.S. Government against recommendations by the A.T.I. resulted in no bids for resale at a recent opening in Washington, D.C.

It was reported that North American Asbestos Co., Chicago, Illinois, is now marketing an asbestos felt as a fire resisting protective insert in mattresses for the hotel, motel and hospital trade.

We completed a lengthy review of all copy and format for the third edition of the A.T.I. Handbook which will go out for bids in July and probably be published in the Fall of 1966.

ASTI approval was received to use 29 pages of ASTI specifications for a charge of \$273.

**MINUTES: Asbestos Textile Institute
Technical Committee Report
June 9, 1966**

SUBJECTS DISCUSSED:

A.T.I. Hand Book. Confirmation of weight values on Tapes.
The Technical Committee was requested to review and confirm the weight values of metallic and plain tapes for reprinting in the revised third edition of the Hand Book. These values are presently shown in Tables Q and R respectively. The Committee made a detailed study of this and recommended the following:

To recommend the weight values for decimal tapes as given in Military Specification Mil-C-1053D for .010", .015", .020", .025", and .030" since the industry usually makes these tapes to conform to the Military Specification and also since there is very minor deviation of the weight values in the Military Specification from those in the current Hand Book.

To confirm the present values of 1/32", 1/16", 1/8" and 1/4" plain tapes and the present values of 1/16", 1/8", and 1/4" metallic tapes as accurate since all the weight values of these come within the tolerable limits of industry's values.

To delete 3/16" plain and 3/16" metallic from the Hand Book since they are not popular sizes.

Industry weight values were found almost identical to Hand Book values with exception of 1/32" plain and the variation here was less than 10% as shown in the appended table. Conformance of Mil-C-1053D with Hand Book is also shown in the table.

The chairman will send a letter with the above recommendation on tapes to H. E. Sunbury with direction that he send this information to Edward Bain who is editing the Hand Book.

Mil-C-10316B. No action to date has been made by the agency on issuing an interim specification correcting the thickness values. The last communication from the agency was on October 29, 1965 at which time the agency agreed to make this correction as requested by W. Massant, Chairman of the Technical Committee at that time. A follow up letter to the agency was made May 4, 1966 by W. Massant. The committee found that the thickness values in Mil-C-10316B are correct but the values in Mil-C-10316A are incorrect.

Consideration was given to two other items but action was not taken. In SS-C-466a specifying as optional the use of .006" nickel wire or .008" monel wire in sewing thread, when this specification comes up for revision. Making a closer tolerance than $\pm 7\%$ on weight of woven asbestos cloth when specification comes up for revision again on D1571.

Revision of ASTM Specifications D315, D1571, and D2100
At the February 1966 meeting the committee reported completion of the 3rd Draft of D315 tape and the 4th Draft of D1571 cloth and that copies of these two were in the hands of Dr. Scroggie's Editorial Committee and Mr. Nicodemus' A-4 Committee. The committee had reason to believe they would be approved and a favorable report was given. The following week the chairman received a letter from Dr. Scroggie's committee making many changes in both specifications. The committee felt that making further revisions would not accomplish very much and that it would be more effective to allow representatives of A-4 Committee to resolve the differences with Dr. Scroggie. Accordingly, on March 3, 1966 a meeting was held in New York between A-4 representatives and Dr. Scroggie and at this meeting the differences were resolved. On the basis of the resolved differences, the Technical Committee drafted the 4th Draft of D315 tape and the 5th Draft of D1571 cloth. Concurrently Mr. P. O. Nicodemus revised D2100 on electrical insulation and submitted it with D315 and D1571. These were satisfactory editorially so far as Dr. Scroggie's committee was concerned, but a temporary set-back resulted when the editor of ASTM took exceptions to these three specifications. After explanation and assistance from Paul Smith of ASTM and P. O. Nicodemus Chairman of A-4 Committee, the three specifications were approved with very minor changes. On May 17, a letter from Paul Smith advised the chairman that these three would appear in the 1966 preprint of ASTM. On June 1, 1966, a copy of the preprint was received and only minor changes were noted.

Letter ballots are now out to all members of D-13 Committee on these three specifications. Results of the ballots have not been received.

Committee members were requested to proof read these specifications and report to the chairman before July 1st. any typographical errors or discrepancies. The chairman is to report these to Paul Smith if any are found.

Howard Bain met briefly with the committee and agreement was made that we would convey information on the status of tapes in the Hand Book within the next two weeks and that he would use information in the preprint on tapes, cloth, and electrical insulation for setting up the revised Hand Book.

Revision of ASTM Specification - D1918 Asbestos Content
At the February 1966 meeting the 1st. Draft on D1918 was made. Since that meeting two more Drafts have been made by correspondence, the 2nd. and 3rd. Drafts. At the present meeting the 3rd. Draft was reviewed and minor changes and corrections made. This will now issue as the 4th. Draft dated June 9, 1966 and copies will be sent to Dr. Scroggie's S-1 Editorial Committee and P. O. Nicodemus' A-4 Committee with the request that they review and respond in time for committee discussion at our next meeting, August 18 and 19th.

Revision of ASTM Specification - D299 Yarn
A start was made on this specification and approximately half of it was covered. The chairman requested that each committee member continue this specification and also D375 roving and send in their comments on how these two should be revised. The several comments will be merged to form the 1st. Draft of D299 and 1st. Draft of D375 and these will be used as the basis for further discussion.

Next Meeting of Technical Committee
Since there are six more specifications to revise, the committee felt that progress on these would be too slow with one day meetings at the regular ATI meetings, especially in view of other items which come up. Accordingly the next meeting was set up as a two day meeting August 18 and 19th at ASTM headquarters in Philadelphia. At that meeting a decision will be made as to whether we will meet one day ahead at our October meeting.

The committee wishes to acknowledge and thank Paul Smith of ASTM for the contribution he has made in revising these specifications.

Subjects Discussed

1. The printing of the new fiber testing manual was completed just about on schedule and copies have been distributed to all companies and groups that had previously placed orders for them. Of the 3113 copies purchased, 423 still remain and are stored in Mr. Sunbury's garage. One hundred of these were ordered by the Institute and are earmarked for sale to parties addressing requests for them to the Institute. The remaining 323 are uncommitted. Of these, 210 resulted from increasing the original order from 2790 to 3000 to take advantage of a price concession. The remaining 113 were the result of a printing over-run and were purchased at a greatly reduced price.
2. Further data on two proposed test procedures -- one for the determination of asbestos fiber frictional properties and the other for determination of amodule content of textile grade fibers -- were to be presented at this meeting. However, the sponsors of these two procedures were absent and discussion is deferred until the next meeting.
3. The committee sends its regards and hopes for an early recovery for Dewey Childers of H.F. Porter who was hospitalized at the time of this meeting.
