IMPORTANT RE TAX REFORM -- UPDATE ON FREEDOM CAUCUS: The House Freedom Caucus had a conference call yesterday about supporting the Senate budget. Here's what **FREEDOM CAUCUS CHAIRMAN MARK MEADOWS (R-N.C.)** told us after the call: "No official positions but the general consensus would be to support the Senate budget without going to conference, provided we can get an accelerated timetable to pass tax reform out of the House by the middle of November."

-- **ON THE TIMING FOR TAX REFORM:** "[I] will say this, I want to get it by the end of the year but I'd be very disappointed if it took that long."

-- **ON THE FED: BARTIROMO:** "Isn't there a way that you can get Taylor and Powell in there? Because you've got a vice chairman opening as well, you can actually put them both in there. The measure is one of several being considered for refugees ... The administration also may expand the use of intensive security checks by multiple federal agencies, called 'security advisory opinions' (SAO) to apply to women from countries designated as high-risk by the U.S. government. Currently there are usually only mandatory SAOs, as they are called, for men from those countries." <http://reut.rs/2yDP6qv>

COMING ATTRACTIONS -- "Niger attack fuels new push for war vote," by Connor O'Brien: "Some lawmakers, citing the deaths of four U.S. soldiers ambushed by terrorists in Niger, called on Congress on Friday to reconsider the broad war authority it granted in 2001 - as the Pentagon telegraphed that more such missions in more places are likely in the offing. The Senate Foreign Relations Committee announced it will hear testimony next week from Secretary of Defense Jim Mattis and Secretary of State Rex Tillerson on the 16-year-old Authorization for Use of Military Force that is now being

used to justify military operations in numerous countries.

"Committee Chairman Bob Corker (R-Tenn.) said in a statement that current threats make it 'perhaps more important than ever that we have a sober national conversation about Congress' constitutional role in authorizing the use of military force.' For some on Capitol Hill, the attack in Niger highlights the need for updated legislation that takes into account the myriad operations against the Islamic State in Iraq and Syria, Al Qaeda and other terrorist groups on several continents." <http://politi.co/2gypuXJ>

-- **"Conflicting Accounts in Niger Ambush Are Subject of Pentagon Investigation,"** by NYT's Dionne Searcey, Helene Cooper and Eric Schmitt: "The Pentagon is trying to determine whether American forces involved in a deadly ambush in Niger this month diverted from their routine patrol to embark on an unapproved mission, military officials said on Friday. The questions have come up because the American and Nigerien soldiers on the patrol have given conflicting accounts about whether they were simply ambushed or were attacked after trying to chase Islamic insurgents, according to military officials from both countries. The episode has engulfed the White House in crisis and prompted demands from members of Congress for answers about what the soldiers were doing before the attack on Oct. 4." <http://nyti.ms/2zqtgpD>

MARC CAPUTO: "Trump is messing with the wrong woman": "Of President Trump's many opponents in Congress, none looks or sounds remotely like Rep. Frederica Wilson, the Miami Democrat known for her bedazzled, sequined-blinged hats, her vibrant matching outfits and her reputation in Florida for never backing down from a fight. But Wilson has never had an foe like Trump or a fight this personal, which began with the president's condolence call to the widow of a young soldier the congresswoman helped steer away from Miami's mean streets - only to see him die in a mysterious ambush in sub-Saharan Niger.

"Despite tough criticism and insults from the president and his allies - a top African-American Trump surrogate, former Milwaukee County Sheriff David A. Clarke, characterized Wilson as 'a buffoon' while White House Chief of Staff John Kelly teed off on her from a White House lectern - the 74-year-old Democrat hasn't flinched, firing back with caustic responses honed by years of full-contact Miami politics.

"The president is a 'jerk' and a 'liar' who 'doesn't know how to be a president,' Wilson

said. She then mocked him for raising her profile. 'You mean to tell me that I have become so important that the White House is following me and my words? Wilson laughed. 'This is amazing. That's amazing. That is absolutely phenomenal. I'll have to tell my kids that I'm a rock star now.'" <http://politi.co/2yFPNzJ>

REALITY CHECK -- "Trump stokes hopes of Obamacare repeal - setting up Senate for another failure," by Jen Haberkorn: "President Donald Trump says the Senate has the votes to repeal Obamacare. That's news to the Senate. 'I think that's aspirational,' said Majority Whip John Cornyn, who counts votes for the GOP. 'If there were 50 votes, we'd be voting,' added John Thune (R-S.D.), another member of Republican leadership.

"Repeatedly claiming that Republicans have the votes to repeal major parts of Obamacare early next year, Trump is stoking expectations that the GOP can fulfill its seven-year pledge before the 2018 midterm elections - a promise that Republicans once again might not be able to keep. The Senate, Trump says, will have the 50 votes needed to enact the bill known as Graham-Cassidy, the last of a series of repeal bids that went down in flames this summer and fall.

"The reality is that no matter what the president says at the White House or how often he says it, nothing has changed at the other end of Pennsylvania Avenue. Not a single 'no' vote has flipped to a 'yes.' When senators talk about repeal after months of failure, they are talking about hopes and dreams - not about 50 votes to pass it. 'I think eventually, I may be speaking aspirationally, eventually we'll have 50 votes for Graham-Cassidy or something like that,' Thune said.'" <http://politi.co/2yZ2SXR>

-- **"ACA enrollment schedule may lock millions into unwanted health plans,"** by WaPo's Amy Goldstein: "Millions of Americans with insurance through the Affordable Care Act could find themselves locked into health plans they do not want for the coming year because of the Trump administration's schedule for the enrollment season that starts in less than two weeks. The complication arises when people who already have health plans under the law are automatically re-enrolled in the same plan. In the past, a few million consumers each year have been auto-enrolled and then were sent

government notices encouraging them to check whether they could find better or more affordable coverage.

"This time, according to a federal document obtained by The Washington Post, the automatic enrollment will take place after it is too late to make any changes. Auto-enrollment will occur immediately after the last day of the ACA sign-up season, which the Trump administration has shortened, leaving the vast majority of such consumers stranded without any way to switch to a plan they might prefer." <http://wapo.st/2gVgmcrc>

PENCE WORLD -- "Financial disclosure shows unusual campaign setup for Pence chief of staff," by Matt Nussbaum and Maggie Severns: "Vice President Mike Pence's chief of staff had a lucrative 2016 campaign season even as his high-profile work on the Trump-Pence campaign was classified as unpaid volunteer work. Nick Ayers, a senior adviser to Pence during the presidential race and now his chief of staff, joined the 2016 team as a volunteer and never took a dime in salary from the Trump-Pence campaign even as he crisscrossed the country with Pence, then the Indiana governor. He served as one of Pence's top aides and prepared him for critical events, including his debate with Sen. Tim Kaine (D-Va.), the Democratic vice presidential nominee.

"But Ayers' Georgia-based political consulting firm, C5 Creative Consulting, did receive a payment of nearly \$75,000 on Aug. 25 from Pence's gubernatorial re-election campaign, 40 days after Pence had been selected as Trump's running mate and withdrawn from the governor's race. In addition to the compensation from Pence's gubernatorial campaign, Ayers received significant payments from the campaign of Eric Holcomb, Pence's lieutenant governor, who sought and won the Indiana governorship after Pence joined the national ticket. Holcomb's campaign paid Ayers' firm nearly \$40,000 between August 2016 and March 2017. Ayers also received payments of more than \$30,000 from Missouri Gov. Eric Greitens' campaign.

"His work for multiple campaigns raises questions whether Pence's gubernatorial re-election campaign was subsidizing, in part or in full, Ayers' work for Trump - though the arrangement may have been perfectly legal, experts told POLITICO. Any payments from different campaigns for Ayers' work on the Trump-Pence campaign would qualify as an illegal in-kind contribution, but there is no indication that this took place."

In the decision issued late Friday, a three-judge panel split 2-1, overturning a decision from a federal judge issued earlier this week that would have allowed the 17-year old girl to have the abortion immediately.

"Instead the D.C. Circuit Court of Appeals ruling, apparently devised by Judge Brett Kavanaugh, opted to find a path that would dispose of the case without making any precedent-setting decisions. The ruling stated that once federal authorities could find a suitable sponsor for the girl, the administration would have to allow her to follow state law to receive the abortion. If the administration can't find a sponsor, a federal district court judge would again have the chance to step in and re-issue the order requiring the administration to permit the teen to leave the shelter for an abortion."
