Dear Mr. Yates:

Re: X.

Mr. Wharton just telephoned about the 2731 bags of chicle last detained. He stated that:

First: The government has examined two lots, one of 136 bags and the other of 810 bags, and found them to contain excess X. Which 946 bags will be further detained subject to cleaning. The government will permit us to clean this chicle for release upon a resulting satisfactory examination. I am asking him to give us the identification numbers. Therefore you must now determine and advise me which detained lot you desire to clean first.

Second: The government will release the remainder of this detained chicle, or 1785 bags, upon our assurance that it will be cleaned and only used if found in due X condition. This assurance I gave. Mr. Wharton is making this release notwithstanding that such chicle has not been examined (at least wholly) and it may contain excess X, which he believes is probable because of the above examination result. I am asking for an identification of these bags, which you may take away upon official release notice and subject to the above assurance.
