## Punts and Passes

About 35,000 tickets to the Stanford-University of Southern California football game this Saturday in the Stanford Stadium have been sold and Don Liebenow, director of the Stanford news service, predicts that 60,000 fans will be in the stands at kick-off time.

Seating space on both sides of the stadium between the goal lines has been sold. Few persons realize it, but only about 30,000 people can be crammed into the side sections between the goal lines. The remaining 60,000 seats are located in the end sections.

The football season at Stanford turned the half-way mark last Saturday when the Cards played their fifth game of the 10-game schedule. Starting next Saturday at the Stanford-U. S. C. game, all varsity games at Stanford will start at 2 p.m. instead of the 2:30 o'clock time as for past home games on the schedule.

Stanford players came through that contest with U. S. F. without injury and the Indians should be at their best strength for the Trojan game. "Woody" Adams, out of action last Saturday with a cracked jaw-bone, is expected to be ready for play. Keith Topping, end and Gordon Head, halfback, also will be available. Topping still limps somewhat on his injured ankle while Head's trouble is in his loins.

The battle for the Peninsula Athletic League championship is now wide-open. San Jose's win over Sequoia and Palo Alto's triumph over San Mateo give all teams a chance for the title. The Sequoia, defending champions, and the Bearcats were rated the strongest teams in pre-season ratings. Now it looks like San Jose might win the championship. The Bulldogs boast of a strong line and a good passing attack. Don't overlook Palo Alto (as we did). The Vikings played like champions during three quarters of the San Mateo game Saturday.
