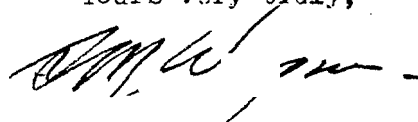

In regard to the use of loaded gasolines in stoves at Camp Young, I have developed the following information.

Orders at the Post are that they are to use contract fuel in all stoves, which means that they are using loaded gasolines, although they are using unleaded gasoline in the lamps. The number of the stoves used is M-1937 and they are all equipped with filters, as far as we know. These stoves are cleaned after every meal and they seem to be having considerable trouble in the tubes and valves.

We are developing further information and will send it on to you as soon as we have it, but I thought you would like to know the above as soon as possible.
